Reject Sunday Racing But May Be On Ballot

There'll be no Sunday horse racing at the big Mohawk Raceway in North Halton this year. At a special meeting the Nassagaweya Township council rejected an application by the Ontario Jockey Club to permit Sunday racing at the million-dollar Mohawk track, just north of Campbellville in North Halton.

"It's a shame," said Nassagaweya Reeve William (Bill) Coulter who lives in Campbellville and who favoured Sunday racing.

41 Votes
 He said the Jockey Club's application was rejected by a 4-1 vote.

The Jockey Club made its application under an amended section of the Lord's Day Act. The new section clears the way

for Sunday racing at Ontario tracks, and the first such races were started last month in Fort Erie. This week the Jockey Club reached a saw-off with Metro Toronto officials which resulted in them agreeing not to hold Sunday racing at the Greenwood track if the way can be cleared for Woodbine to have races on Sunday.

Reeve Coulter said the rejection of the Jockey Club's application by Nassagaweya township council kills any chance of Mohawk becoming the first Ontario harness track to have Sunday races. He also said it kills any chance of Sunday racing this season.

5 Winter Season
 The summer season, started at Mohawk August 12th, and it follows 23 night of racing last

March. Leading the opposition against Sunday racing in North Halton was Mrs. Anne MacArthur, an outspoken councillor who has become known as the "voice of the north." She has been involved in several public controversies and she recently announced she will do "all within my power to block Sunday racing coming to Mohawk."

She said that as a school teacher she sees the moral damage that Sunday racing could do to youngsters living in the north part of the county. She also said Sunday racing would mean those Campbellville residents employed at the track would have to work on Sunday.

Extra-Work
 Reeve Coulter said the track has been a "real boom" for the Campbellville area and he said that by rejecting Sunday racing the council has denied the extra work it could mean for residents of North Halton.

"Many people in this area work at the track part-time and they keep themselves out of financial difficulty with the extra money they earn," he said. "Sunday is an ideal time for part-time work."

Reeve Coulter said an attempt will be made later this year to have the Sunday racing issue put on the ballot when municipal elections are held early in December. He said this would permit the public to decide the issue.
