Fashion plays its part in roses as well as the hemline, with shades of orange being the most popular this year. To keep them in top condition the flowers are sprayed every ten days. According to general manager Joe Pokluda, the home gardener should do the same. Visitors from a wide area have viewed the roses on the tenth line opposite Sheridan Nurseries headquarters.

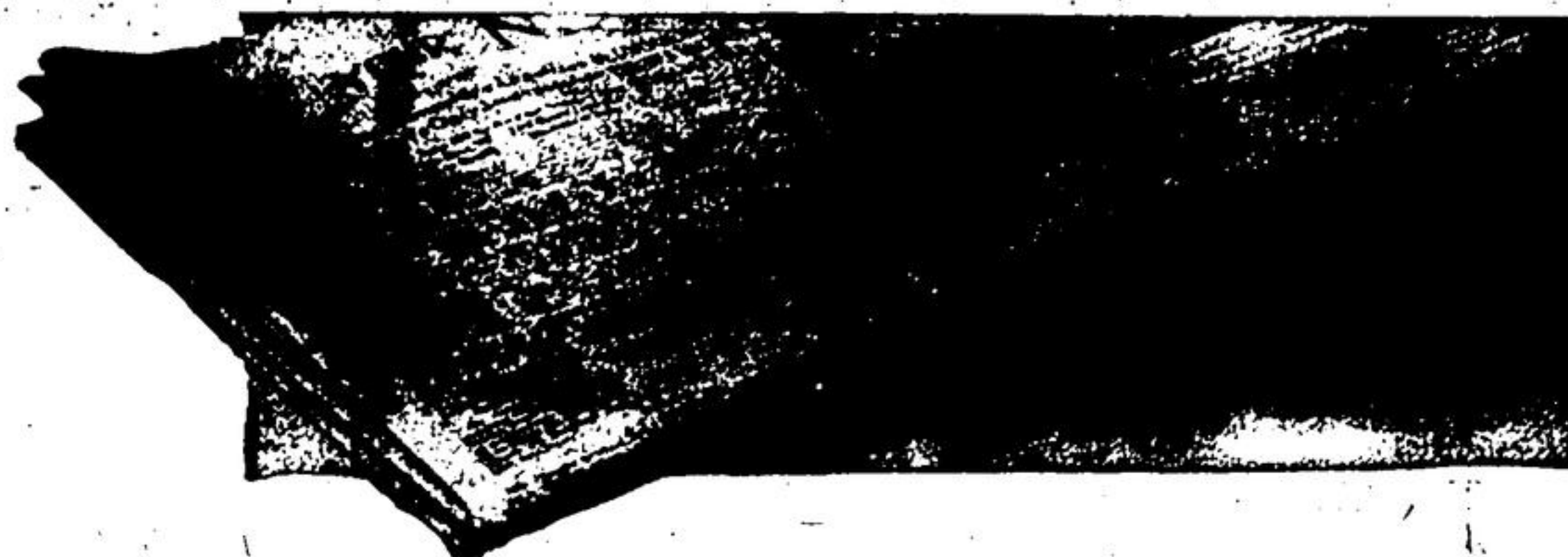
