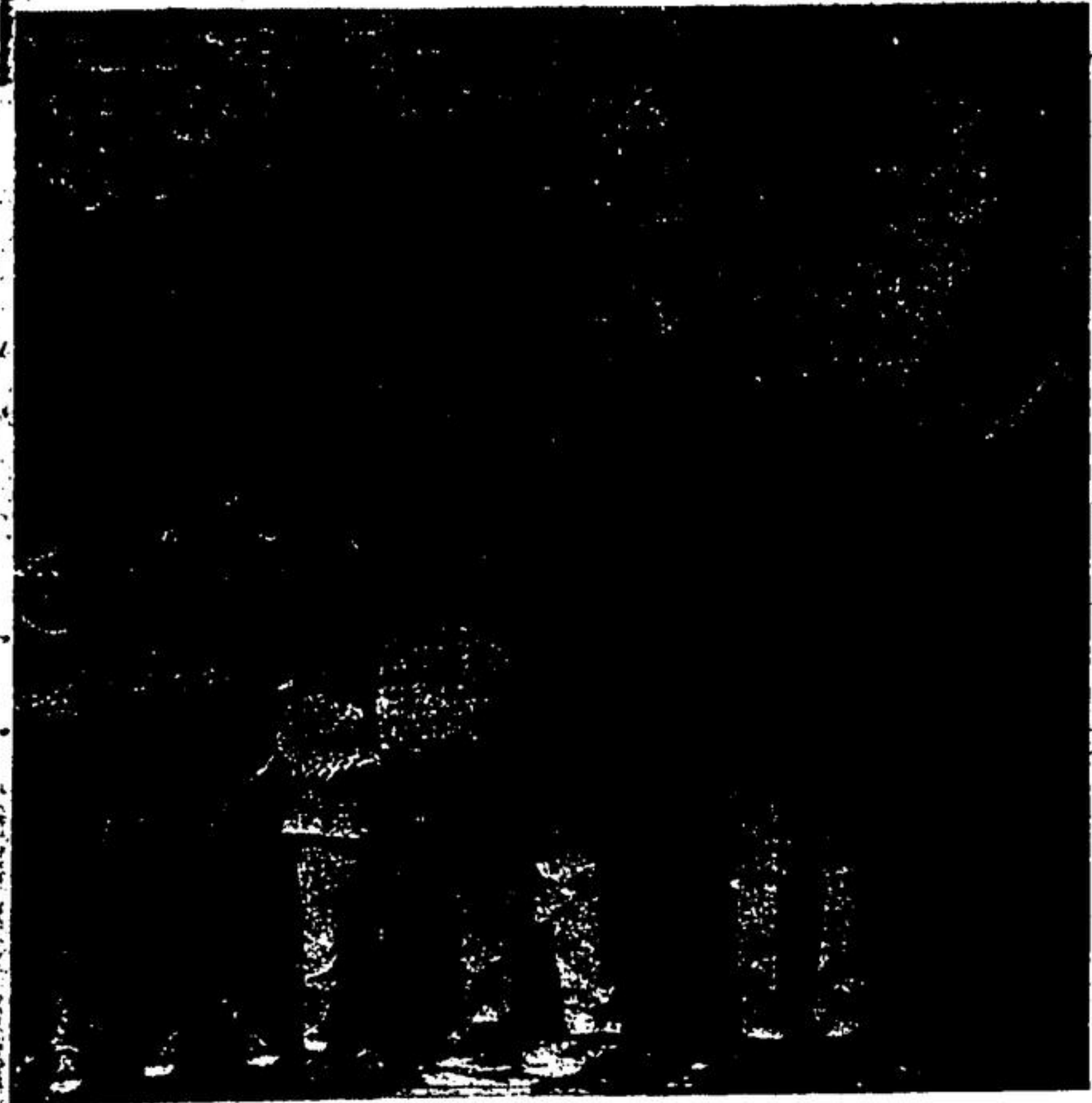


Well Deserved Honor for Alf "Mr. Hornby" Brigden

The boys of Hornby paid tribute to a faithful servant composed by Mrs. Jim McKay Sunday, August 18, when they set aside the afternoon to say a warm "thank you" to Alfred Brigden.

Mr. Brigden was the main instigator of Hornby Community Park and besides helping to build the park he has worked there as custodian, groundkeeper, concession operator and clean-up man practically seven days a week ever since it opened. He plants the flowers, cuts the grass, pulls the weeds, levels the roads, paints the fences and does a million and one other chores around the 10 acre parksite.

(SHORTHORN) BULL SESSION Cattle, Not Complaints This Beef Club's Interest

Members and friends of the Halton - Peel Beef Producers Association held a twilight meeting at the farm of Reford Gardhouse, Milton.

Everyone placed a class of Shorthorn bulls, with reasons by Bill Jackson, Bob Merry, Pat Patterson and Bill Sheard. Official reasons were given by Emerson Clarke, manager of Scotsdale Farms, Georgetown.

The combined weight of the four bulls was guessed with Lloyd Vinley, from Peel coming closest, followed by Peter Stemann, Hornby. The 1947 Grand Champion bull at Chicago weighed 1045 lbs., with Dr. McAninch, Health of Animals Branch, Toronto, coming the closest with a guess of 1030 lbs.

Gail Brown, the champion bagpipe player who recently returned from competitions in Great Britain, entertained the audience.

Dr. McAninch discussed the functions of the Health of Animals Branch. He stated that last year 150 million livestock and poultry carcasses were examined in 338 slaughter plants across this country. Each month one ton of meat is confiscated at Toronto International Airport from passengers arriving from overseas. This meat is destroyed in an attempt to prevent introduction of diseases into Canada.
