THIRTY-SIX SHOW THEY CAN SURVIVE

Thirty-six swimmers demonstrated for Georgetown Community Pool instructors that they can survive if involved in a boating mishap during Survival Award testing just completed.

The applicants, ranging in ability from juniors with a basic swimming knowledge to senior class graduates, went through a series of simulated manoeuvres that might accompany an emergency situation while instructors Chris Sargent, Glenda Emerson, and Andrea Chaplin looked on with a critical eye.

The tests included a forward roll into the water from the pool deck; swimming to a life jacket some distance away and putting it on; swimming with the life jacket on to a companion and administering mouth to mouth artificial respiration while still in the water. When this routine was completed the applicant had to return across the width of the pool on the back. The drownproofing technique also had to be demonstrated, as well as the "reaching assist".

Just three of the 36 who tried failed to come up to standard.

The Survival Award, a Red Cross badge, was introduced last year.

Cool weather and electrical storms caused the testing to be postponed three times.

Neil Korzak, one of three Bantams brought up for the game, rapped the single that scored Inglis with the winning run.
