Approve 2-Way Radio County Roads Hook-Up

Two way radios for the county's maintenance will cost the county \$12,291.50. County council approved a recommendation from the

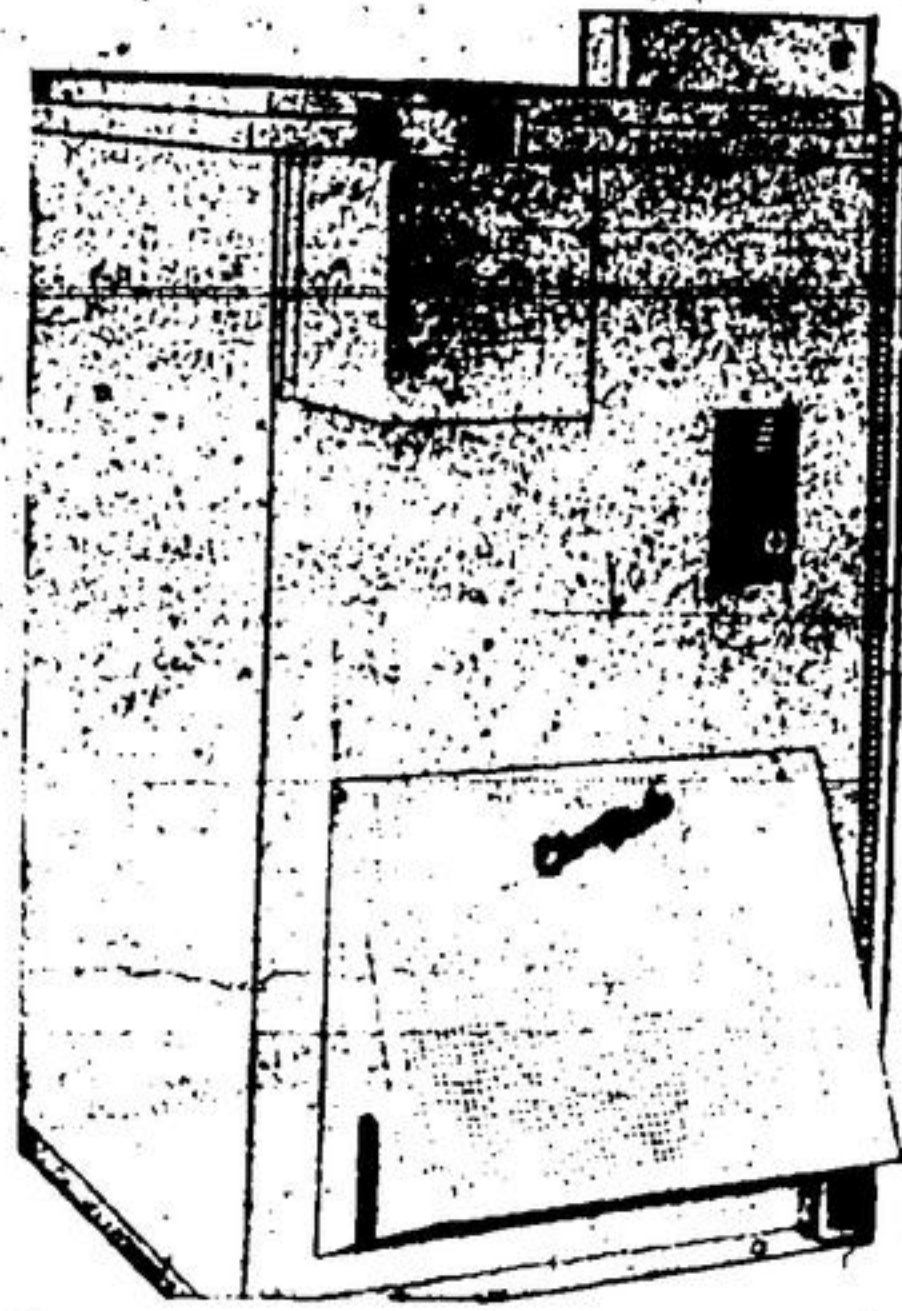
county roads committee to have the county engineer proceed with arrangements to lease land on Battlemake Point for a radio tower site, and to call for quotations for the supply and erection of a radio tower and associated radio building. The committee accepted the

tender of Canadian General Electric for the supply and installation of the two way mobile radio system, total maximum cost being \$12,291.50. One councillor said he could understand the need for such radios in isolated examples — a bad midwinter snowstorm, for

instance — but that in any other circumstances the maintenance man could make a telephone call, for 10 cents. The next public holiday will be Thanksgiving Day.
