27.2 Million Budget For Halton School System

Ten school boards are spending more than \$27,000,000 this year to educate the thousands of pupils in schools around Halton County.

Figures released to the Interim School Organization Committee point up cost comparisons.

They show Burlington, with the largest school population, has budgeted for a total of \$11,636,457 of that amount.

Oakville comes second with expenditures of \$10,020,410.

Georgetown is next at more than \$2,250,000. Then comes Milton (\$1,229,133), Equestrus Twp. (\$879,491), Acton (\$871,546), Nassagaweya Township (\$387,607).

The costs include instruction administration, plant operation, maintenance, transportation, tuition fees to boards, long term capital expenditures, auxiliary agencies and other services.

One table shows the total fixed assets of the ten boards to be \$32,870,157. Elementary schools account for \$27,161,225 of this and secondary schools stand at \$25,706,932.

Out of the total \$27,318,500 to be spent this year by the 10 Halton County boards, revenues to balance this off will come from two sources.

Provincial Grants
Provincial grants will take care of \$11,219,788 of it and
