Since local issues have been emphasized as having priority let me take this opportunity to expand on what I see as a real opportunity to improve the life of Georgetown.

As a newcomer, I am becoming increasingly aware of the lack of recreational programs and facilities to occupy our young and not so young people. When we begin thinking in terms of what might be an immediate program or project to undertake may I suggest a tennis club.

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Town of Georgetown in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario and being composed of part of Victoria Avenue in the said Town of Georgetown as shown on Registered Plan Number 32 on file in the Registry Office for the said County, containing by admeasurement 0.022 Acres, be the same more or less and which said parcel of land is more particularly described as follows:

PREMISING that Main Street North in the Town of Georgetown has a bearing of North 43 deg. 58' 30" West astronomic and relating all bearings herein thereto;

COMMENCING at the point of intersection of the North-east Limit of Main Street North with the North Limit of Victoria Avenue in the said Town of Georgetown as shown on said Registered Plan Number 32;

### 65 Learn Football Here But None from Georgetown

Sixty-five 'young lions' from schools have been knocking southern Ontario secondary heads at Camp Norval on Georgetown's eastern limits for a week to get the jump on their home school teammates in preparation for the 1968 football season which gets under way this week.

The boys capped their week of conditioning and instruction in fundamentals with a couple of games in Georgetown park Friday afternoon, a junior tussle preceding the seniors' show. It enabled the seven member coaching staff to get a look at the results of their tutoring, and gave the players a last chance to sparkle before the awarding of special recognition on the final night of camp.

The teaching staff included some familiar names to football followers, Pete Robertson, a former University of Toronto Blue, was head coach. Others were Bob Godley, another U of T Blue who had a trial with Hamilton Tiger-Cats; Vince Franco, former Washington State team member; Don Archer who played at West Virginia; and McMaster, John Tutty of Streetsville; Wayne Wessell of Leaside; and Brock Cromwell of Toronto Northern Secondary School.

"We packed a lot into an average day," Pete Robertson told The Herald. "The boys were up at 7:30 and had a three mile run every morning before breakfast. The rest of the day was spent practicing specific plays and moves, with each boy working on the skills required to play his chosen position."

Even when the boys relaxed after supper they were bettering their physical condition by engaging in a tug of war, water polo, basketball and baseball with competition among the 10 cabins very keen.

Last item on each day's schedule was a "chalk talk" by a member of the staff or guest experts. One was Nobby Wirkowski who spoke on offensive football, and another was Waterloo Lutheran University head coach Tuffy Knight whose forte is defense.

This is the fifth year for the school, the only one of its kind in Ontario and in the past three years when it has been held at Camp Norval instead of the original site at Tam O'Shanter coach Robertson has only one regret. "We've never had a Georgetown boy apply."
