

YAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Yown of Georgetown proposes to pass a by-law to close up and stop up all that portion of Victoria Avenue in the Yown of Georgetown more particularly described as follows:

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Town of Georgetown in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario and being composed of part of Victoria Avenue in the said Town of Georgetown as shown on Registered Plan Number 32 on file in the Registry Office for the said County, containing by admeasurement 0.022. Acres be the same more or less and which said parcel of land is more particulary described as follows:

PREMISING that Main Street North in the Town of Georgetown has a bearing of North 43 deg., 58'-30" West astronomic and relating all bearings herein thereto;

COMMENCING at the point of intersection of the North-east Limit of Main Street North with the North Limit of Victoria Avenue in the said Town of Georgetown as shown on said Registered Plan Number 32;

THENCE NORTH 74 deg., 28'-30" East, along the said North Limit of Victoria Avenue, 19.34 feet to a point therein;

THENCE South 43 deg., 58'-30" East, across said Victoria Avenue along a line drawn parallel to the aforesaid North-east Limit of Main Street North, 56.30 feet more or less to a point in the South Limit of Victoria Avenue;

THENCE South 74 deg., 28'-30" West, along the said South Limit of Victoria Avenue 19.34 feet to the point of intersection of the said South Limit of Victoria Avenue with the said North-east Limit of Main Street North as shown on said Registered Plan Number 32;

THENCE North 43 deg., 58'-30" West, along the said North-East Limit of Mahr Street North being also the Southwest Limit of Victoria Avenue, 50.30 feet more or less to the point of commencement.
