

# THE DISTRICT AT A GLANCE

**MILTON HEIGHTS**—Milton Heights needs water services urgently, officials agreed at a meeting this week, but it's not willing to be annexed by neighbouring Milton to get the service. Officials from Equeusing, Nassageweysa and Milton met to discuss supplying of water services to the area where residents claim pollution has stopped them from using well water.

**ORANGEVILLE**—Despite poor weather, Orangeville's Fall Fair almost set a new record in attendance. The paid admissions for the 110th annual event was second only to the town's centennial year fair in 1963. W. I. Ewing, the fair's secretary treasurer, said everything went off without a hitch in spite of the constant drizzle.

**ROCKWOOD**—An incensed Eramosa Township council this week instructed clerk Lloyd Hindley to notify a local farmer that his dogs had caused \$700 to \$800 damage to area livestock and must be destroyed within 48 hours. They claimed to have proof the farmer's dogs had been terrorizing the area.

**ERIN**—Something new in Erin Township schools this term are kindergartens. Eighty-seven were enrolled when these classes were inaugurated last Tuesday on a half-day basis at Ospringe and Hillburgh, and full days at Brissane. Kindergarten classes were introduced to Erin village school a few terms back.

**ACTON**—A fat packet of anti-Jewish "hate" literature has been received in the mail by Mr. and Mrs. Norman Turner of R. R. 3 Acton. The envelope, postmarked Bradford, contained copies of articles from United States publications and a bumper sticker which advises "unite Germany." The material contained an address where the reader can send for reprints of such articles as "The Liberal Is Your Deadly Enemy."

**STREETSVILLE**—Almost 20 acres of land at the northeast limit of Streetsville has been annexed from Mississauga. The annexation will permit orderly extension of streets and other services in a 106 unit housing development within Streetsville's limits.

**MILTON**—A total of 22,000 is the estimated attendance at the Ontario Steam & Antique Preservers annual Steam Era week-end at Milton. The record holder was the 1966 edition which saw an estimated 30,000 visitors. Last year, interest slumped, and officials blamed it on other centennial events on the same week-end.

**BRAMBLEA**—Eight portable classrooms are being moved from Streetsville and Milton to handle the overflow of students at Bramblea Secondary School. Two portables were in use there last year, and with the eight additional ones 240 students will be receiving education in the emergency quarters.

**BRAMPTON**—Peel Memorial Hospital at Brampton will be overcrowded within five years despite an almost completed extension which will nearly double present capacity. Administrator Howard Kraft suggested it may be necessary to build another hospital in Chinguacousy Township.

He said the total will likely swell to 250 by the time the schedule starts this weekend with another fifty getting into the action as the season progresses. Last season Youth Bowling's enrolment here totalled 219.
