## Two Companies Operating Now, Academy Road Plant

Two companies now operate jointly in a plant at 9 Academy Road, Die-Mold Tool Ltd., and Northern Vibrator Manufacturing.

"The only manufacturer of pneumatic vibrators in Canada," general manager W. A. Athawes describes the operation.

Despite the word, a vibrator is not a redempt machine, but another type of shaker. These vibrators, from tiny ones to fairly large shake out any material which can compress, such as sand, flour, feed. Most railroad cars with such loads use vibrators in unloading.

On the other hand, they can also be used to compact materi-

als, so more can be packaged. This would apply in packaging such products as instant powders, or detergents. They can roughly be compared to a flour sifter, or going away back to the ash sifter, which rocted the ashes from the old coal furnaces.

There are sixteen men employed in the two closely related plants.

In the Die-Mold Tool section under general manager, Jack Sunnucks, metal dies make the metal molds for various plastic products. An 800 ton hobbing press shapes the molds.

## Important Changes in Winter Wheat Insurance

The Crop Insurance Commission of Ontario today announced three important changes in its Winter Wheat Insurance Plan.

In addition to the 60, 70 and 80 per cent levels of coverage previously available, farmers may now insure for 50 percent of their average farm yield. The low rates established for this latter coverage produce a premium cost as low as 62 cents per acre in some areas.

"This lower level of coverage," said K. E. Lantz, chairman of the commission, "was provided in response to considerable demand for disaster-type protection to cover out-of-pocket expenses at the lowest possible cost."

The Regulations have been amended to advance the final date for acceptance of applications to October 1st, or 10 days after completion of seeding, whichever occurs first.

To encourage and promote good-crop husbandry, acceptable seeding dates have been established by regions. In Eastern Ontario, the final date for seeding is September 15th, in Central and Southwestern Ontario it is September 20th, and in Southern Ontario, October 20th. Later seeded crops are not insurable.
