

Sunday Sod Turning Starts 'Hillcrest' Church

Sunday at the corner of No. 5 Sideroad and the 7th Line, across from Pineview School, the first sod was turned for the new Hillcrest United Church.

This is really a new church since it was formed through the amalgamation of two old established churches, Ashgrove and Hornby United.

The name reflects the location on the crest of the hill on the 7th Line between the two communities. The decision to unite was made last November when both congregations voted overwhelmingly to do so.

It was an unusual service with Rev. Keith Hawkes accompanying the hymns on the trumpet, and children invited to bring shovels and help turn the sod.

The new church will be built by Snow Construction, whose owner Jim Snow is M.P.P. for Halton East a member of the church.

The first sods were turned by the two oldest members of the congregations 85 year old Arthur Ruddle and 91 year old Fred Wrigglesworth. Six foot four Jim Snow was handed a small shovel to turn the sod, and had to crouch to reach it.

Many church members, each representing a church group were called to turn a sod, then the children took over, enthusiastically trying to dig the whole excavation.

The services closed with a hymn and benediction.

Blood Donors One Up Over Last Year's Clinics

The total number of blood packs collected at this year's three clinics is ahead of last year's by one.

Monday, the clinic in Holy Cross auditorium produced 265 donations. Ten of the 275 who offered blood were rejected. Twenty-six offered blood for the first time.

The Monday donations brought to 902 the number of blood packs collected at 1068 clinics here to date. A March clinic produced 332, and another in June 305. After three clinics last year the total was 901.

The Georgetown Red Cross Branch, which operated the clinics, will hold a fourth December 9.

PART OF DUFFERIN STREET IN THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown proposes to pass a by-law to close up and stop up all that portion of Dufferin Street in the Town of Georgetown more particularly described as follows:

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Town of Georgetown in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario and being composed of part of Dufferin Street in the said Town of Georgetown as shown on Registered Plan Number 72 on file in the Registry Office for the said County, containing by admeasurement 0.061 Acres be the same more or less and which said parcel of land is more particularly described as follows:

PREMISING that Main St. North in the said Town of Georgetown has a bearing of North 43 deg., 58'30" West astronomic and relating all bearings herein thereto;

COMMENCING at the point of intersection of the North-east Limit of Main Street North with the North-west Limit of Dufferin St. in the said Town of Georgetown as shown on said Registered Plan Number 72;

THENCE NORTH 48 deg., 38'55" East, along the said North-west Limit of Dufferin Street, 75.20 feet to a point therein;

THENCE South 43 deg., 21'08" East, along a line drawn at Right Angles to the said North-west Limit of Dufferin Street, 35.64 feet more or less to a point in the Southeast Limit of Dufferin Street;

THENCE South 48 deg., 38'55" West, along the said South-west Limit of Dufferin Street, 74.80 feet to the point of intersection of the said South-East Limit of Dufferin Street with the aforesaid North-East Limit of Main Street North as shown on said Registered Plan Number 72;

THENCE North 43 deg., 58'30" West, along the said North-east Limit of Main Street North being also the South-west Limit of Dufferin Street, 35.64 feet more or less to the point of commencement;

The said By-law will be dealt with at a meeting of Council to be held for the purpose of considering the said by-law on Monday, September 22nd, 1948, at 8.00 p.m. at the Municipal Building, 34 Main Street North, Georgetown.
