## Sewage Plant Trouble Cause Infiltration

"I expect we'll have a depopulation from at least one industry, and perhaps others too," said Cr. Jim Young on Monday commenting on an industrial waste-by-law which council will consider at a future meeting.

Copies of the by-law were in the hands of councillors that night. It has been prepared by the town engineer, and according to council embodies the best features of by-laws in force in other communities.

Mr. Young said that news that the town's disposal plant is 25 per cent overloaded is not as sensational as it would appear. The overloading is caused by water infiltrating the system, he said, which will be overcome when improvements are completed to the system next year.

The waste by-law, he said, is to guard against overloading the sewage system with organic matter. If this happens, the town will be in real trouble, he said.

PREMISES that Main Street North in the Town of Georgetown has a bearing of North 43 deg., 58'30" West astronomic and relating all bearings herein thereto;

COMMENCING at the point of intersection of the North-east Limit of Main Street North with the North Limit of Victoria Avenue in the said Town of Georgetown as shown on said Registered Plan Number 32;

THENCE NORTH 74 deg., 28'30" East, along the said North Limit of Victoria Avenue, 19.34 feet to a point therein;

THENCE South 43 deg., 58'30" East, across said Victoria Avenue along a line drawn parallel to the aforesaid North-east Limit of Main Street North, 56.30 feet more or less to a point in the South Limit of Victoria Avenue;
