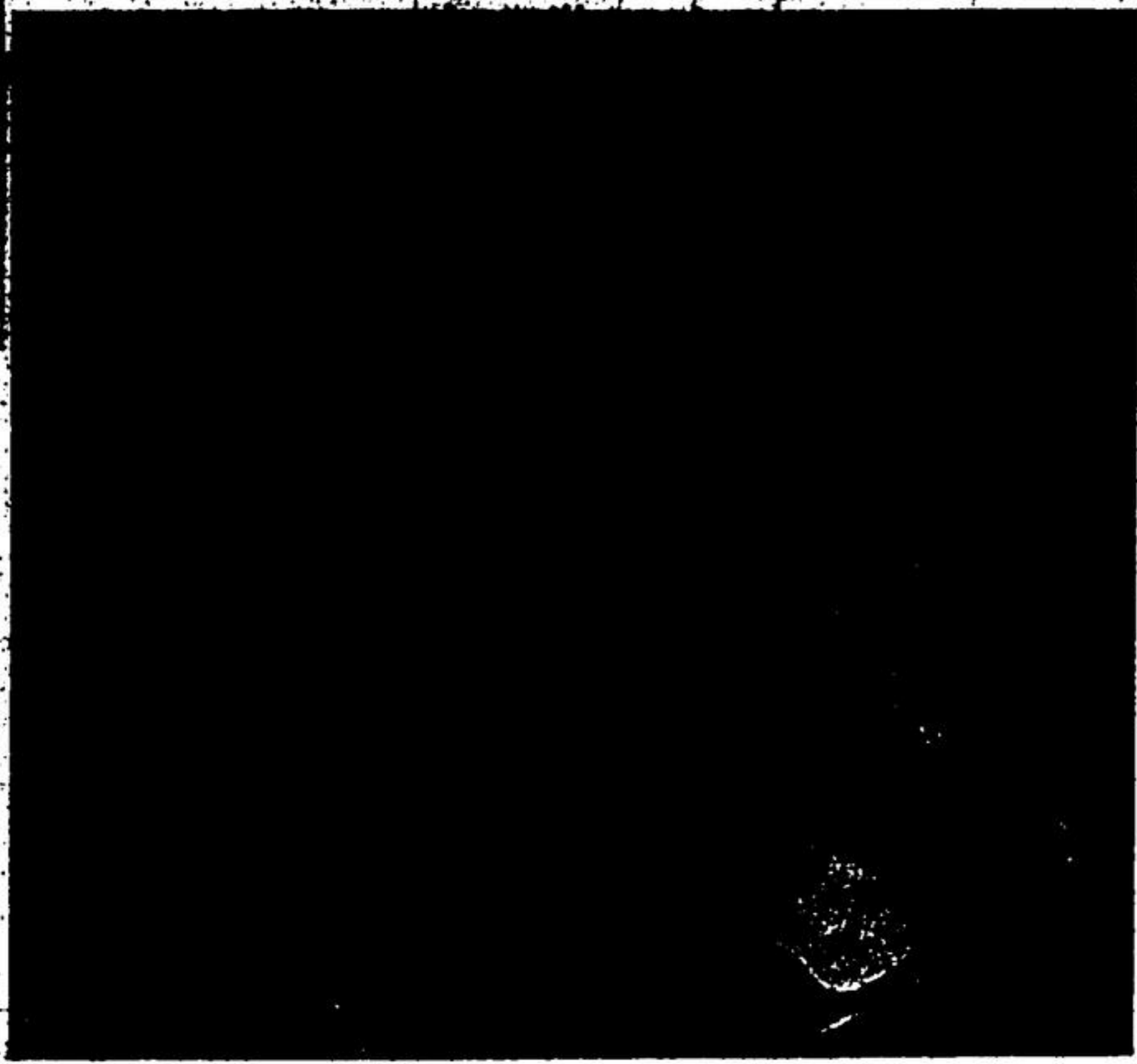


GO GO GALS KART CLUB'S PRETTY PILOTS
