Check to be Made on Zoning Violations

Tighter control over buildings having a non-conforming use in residential areas was forecast Monday when council decided to meet with Walter Pacholok, who is zoning and building inspector.

The discussion was sparked when an Edward Street resident, Mrs. James Baillo expressed concern that a garage which has been built on a nearby property will be used for a purpose other than a private garage.

This prompted Cr. Jim Young to mention that a highway sign which council had ordered removed is still there, that another person is operating a repair business in his home, and an apartment has been created in a single family dwelling district.

Some of the difficulty might be in the administrator's area of jurisdiction, said Cr. Roy Ballentine. He can issue a permit in good faith, and if the recipient later uses a building for other purposes, council should decide who is to check this.

"Who is to lay a charge?" said the councillor. "The police? Council? We didn't tell Mr. Pacholok when we hired him that we expected this to be part of his duties."

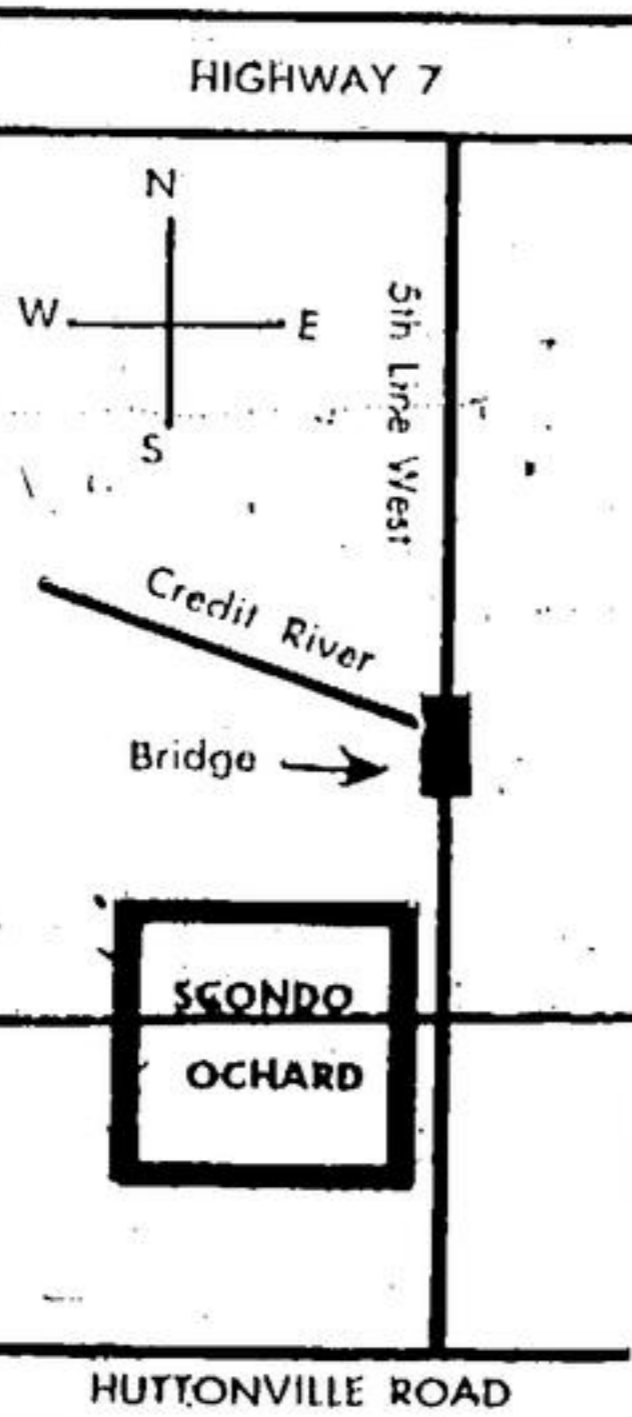
