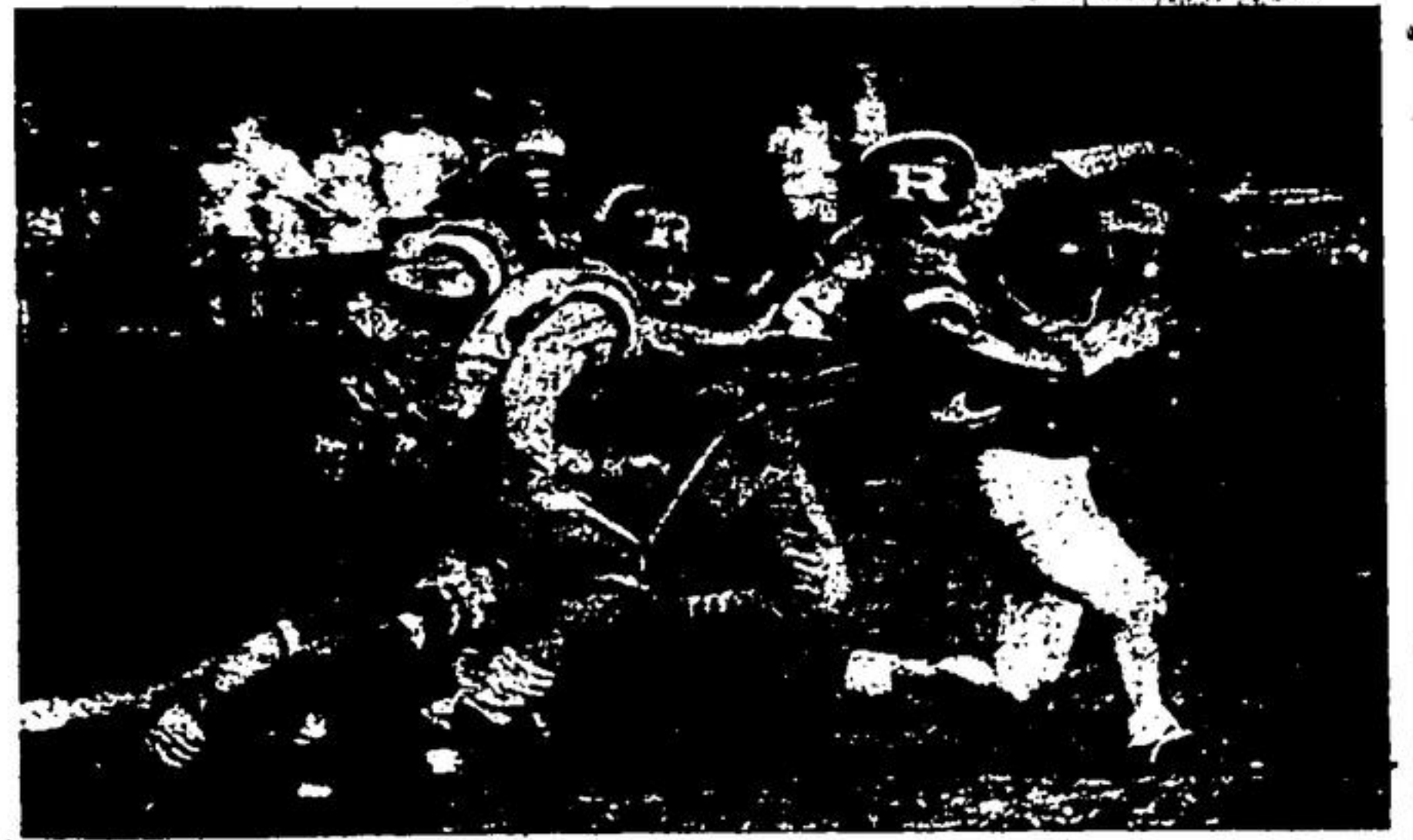




ONE FOR ALL

Junior, Senior Rebs Gain Football Ties with J.F.R.

Georgetown and John F. Ross high school football teams might just as well have stayed at their books and cut the points in equal pieces, Friday. In a junior senior double header in Georgetown park which raised the curtain on the 1968 season everybody came away with a point. Juniors played to a 14-14 draw and seniors continued the balancing act in game two with a 7-all indecision.

In a hard-hitting test that turned a number of the senior Rebs into painful spectators Georgetown jumped in front on Bill Sykes' punt that went for a single point in the first quarter.

Both teams had sustained drives inside scoring territory in the third quarter, but Georgetown went to the air in the fourth to wipe out Guelph's margin.

A 30 yard pass and run play took the ball to the Royal 10 yard line, and after one seven yard crack to the three, Barry Cook plunged the rest of the way on second down for the major score.

The convert that would have won the half game for the red and blue didn't get as far as the posts as an outside rusher twisted through the protection to block the attempt.

In the late stages Royals failed to take advantage of two good chances to grab victory. They chose to go for a touchdown when a drive took them deep into Georgetown territory but a brick wall defence stop-

ped them on the one yard line. Rebels' three plays failed to use up the remaining time and Royals were handed a fine chance to break it up. Again they couldn't capitalize.

In the junior tilt points were hard to come by until the second quarter when quarterback John Blair flipped a pass to Rob Sargent. The play covered 30 yards and produced the opening touchdown which Ron Fozal converted for a 7-0 Georgetown lead.

A bad snap was chased into the end zone by Blair in the second quarter and he was trapped in there for a two point safety touch that erased the goose egg.
