Mrs. Sally Duffield, thanked the speaker and presented her with a gift.



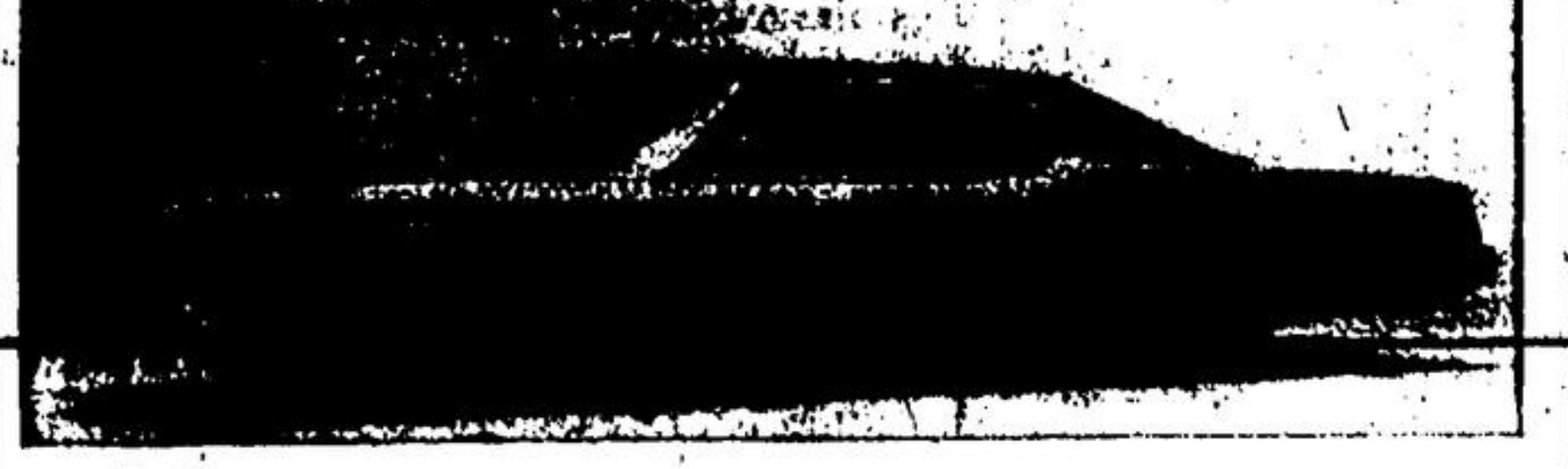
