In the tradition of show business, "the show must go on," says president Chris Fisher, and it will, their first production of the season "Under the Yum Yum Tree" will go on as scheduled.

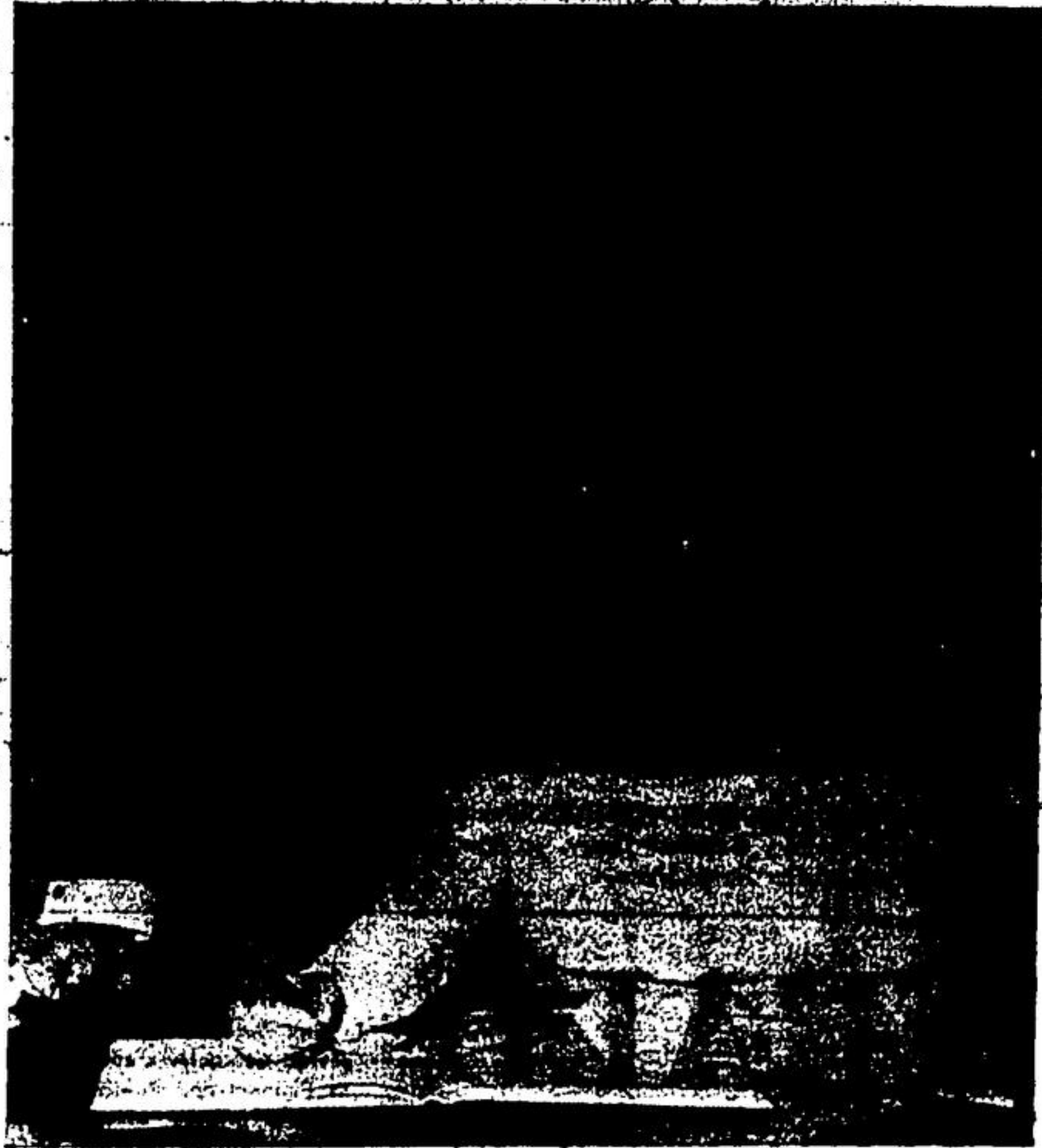
While the loss in money is large to a struggling amateur group, the loss in hard work represents hundreds of hours of sawing, hammering, painting and sewing.

The upstairs of the old town hall has been their dilapidated home since they began nine years ago. Partitioned by a large backdrop, one side was used as a working area, while on the other side, competing with the noise, were the actors rehearsing the shows.

The Legion has already come forth with a helping hand. They have offered the legion hall for practice Sunday afternoons and evenings. A sister group, Globe Productions, currently rehearsing "My Fair Lady" have offered any of their scenery not being used in their show.

"Under the Yum Yum Tree" will be presented with a simpler setting than the one consumed by the flames. Little Theatre members are making the parts in their own homes at their own expense, under the guiding hand of Harry Haylock.

In a departure from the usual dates, this year the first night will be on a Monday, to enable merchants and their employees who work week-ends to attend Monday night, October 28, will be the premiere night, then Friday and Saturday Nov. 1st and 2nd.

Those bird perches some people call TV antennae are starting to disappear from Georgetown roofs as the modern marvel of television by cable reaches more and more homes every week. Subscribers and there are many, are enjoying the luxury of all the channels all the time without interference and without that solitary antler on the roof.

The absence of the antenna can do much to improve the overall look of residential areas.

But what exactly is cable TV? It is the best available in television reception bringing eight clear channels via coaxial cable with consistently good pictures and sound. That annoying "fringe" or "snowy" reception no longer need be tolerated.

Another advantage is that installation is as simple as having a telephone hooked up.

First question most people ask is, "How does it work?" A super antenna with twin 150 foot towers has been erected on a site in Georgetown's eastern limit. The spot was chosen after careful electronic search and planning resulting in optimum reception of the eight available channels.
