## "Wish Me Luck" Last Words Woman Killed at CN Crossing

Shortly after asking a neighbour to wish her luck at bingo, an Acton woman was killed at the CNR crossing on Mill Street not far from her home.

Mrs. James Brydon, 62, was struck by a west bound passenger train and hurled 130 feet along the tracks.

Motorists and pedestrians on both sides of the crossing witnessed the tragedy. Warning signals were flashing and traffic had halted to await the two-car "Dayliner" enroute from Toronto to Palmerston.

Thomas W. Donaldson, the conductor told Atton OPP Constable Nick Farion that he saw a woman approach the crossing. She was looking down and seemed to be in a hurry. He said the train was travelling at a normal speed.

Engineer Hugh Dobbie of Palmerston also noticed a woman hurrying towards the tracks. He thought she had crossed safely until he heard the bump of the impact.

Brian Farrell, 18, a Georgetown Police Cadet, who lives in Acton witnessed the fatality while waiting for the train to pass.

"But I thought I was seeing things. I started down town and then came back to make sure everything was all right."

The "Dayliner" came to a halt about 200 yards east of the crossing. After the arrival of police, the train crew set up flares, preparatory to flagging down an east bound passenger due at 8:15 p.m. There was no other means of communication as the station in Acton is closed.

Mrs. Brydon died between 7:20 and 7:25, according to the police report.

## Report on Jailbreak Labelled "Confidential"

A spokesman for the Department of Correctional Services said this week the report dealing with the recent Hinton County jailbreak will not be released to the public . . . or to the provincial legislature.

The spokesman said: "The report is highly confidential and since it deals with the security of the jail it will not be made public, nor will it be released to the Legislature."

Against Policy He said that it is not the policy of the department to make public reports that deal with jailbreaks.

"If we made these reports public we would be playing right into the hands of those who may try jailbreaks," he said.

Commenting on the release of a report earlier this year concerning Hinton Jail the spokesman said this particular report dealt with the overall condition of the jail, not its security. He said the report was released because it was the result of an investigation ordered after Hinton county jail had been discussed in the Legislature. This report said the jail was unfit and should be replaced.

Prepared Report The jailbreak report has been turned over to the Minister of Correctional Services, Allan Grossman, and it was prepared by jails inspector James Beavis.

Jails Inspector Beavis visited Hinton County Jail following the recent break on Sunday, September 15, when McKenzie and three others escaped after beating two guards over the head. Three have been recaptured.

"It was a report of a different kind and did not deal with one specific jailbreak," he said.
