Limehouse Lady Pilot In 200-Mile Air Race

Michigan's 13th annual small aircraft race for women pilots will be flown October 5th out of Ann Arbor Municipal Airport Ann Arbor, Michigan, and among them will be a Comanche piloted by Mrs. Barbara Brotherton of R.R. 1, Limehouse. Sponsored by the Michigan Chapter of the Ninety-Nines (international organization of licensed women pilots), the event draws entries from all over the country and Canada. Mrs. Brotherton's co-pilot will be Mrs. Esme Williams of Islington.

A round robin event of approximately 200 miles, the race starts and ends at Ann Arbor and includes at least two check points enroute. The exact course is not revealed until each plane is impounded for the night before the race.

Women pilots may fly solo or be accompanied by a male or female co-pilot or passenger. Prizes totalling \$1,050 in cash and trophies for first through fifth place will be awarded. The Paul Bunyan Travelling Trophy goes to the first place winner.

Other trophies include the Charlotte Connelly Annual Trophy awarded to the private pilot with the best score; the runner-up trophy for sixth place; for the 13th placer in the 13th race; and the Violet M. Dixon trophy for best performance pilot and co-pilot with no higher rating than private, a new trophy to be awarded annually.
