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## In Hall of Fame

### Georgetown Athletes Named to List of Greats

Two of Georgetown's all-time great athletes were among ten honoured before 1,200 persons Saturday night at Oakville arena, when they were inducted as charter members of the new Halton County Hall of Fame.

Introduced by Magistrate James Black, seven of the honoured men stepped to the dais to receive their certificates and plaques of the gathered crowd.

Two of the charter members were Blackburn of Georgetown and Pete McMullen of Milton, who were honoured posthumously while Georgetown's other man on the list of greats, Bob Goldham, was unable to attend the affair.

The late Pere Blackburn was one of the best baseball players ever to come out of Georgetown. Several times in his career he went south for major league tryouts. However, he refused to play ball in the minor league systems and always returned to play his ball here.

Bob Goldham, also of Georgetown, was known as "a second goal keeper" when he introduced a new style of defense while playing with the Detroit Red Wings. Goldham, who grew up and learned to play hockey in Georgetown, was often reckless as he became known for his

suicide dives in front of blazing shots.

Other members of the list of Halton greats are, Ollie Johnson of Oakville, Neil Gibbons of Acton Soany Township, Acton, Mac McCleary of Oakville, Mike Clement of Milton, Len Andrews of Campbellville and Lefty Jordan of Burlington.

Sports appreciation night was conceived to honour those persons in Halton County who have worked hard to advance sports in their home towns.

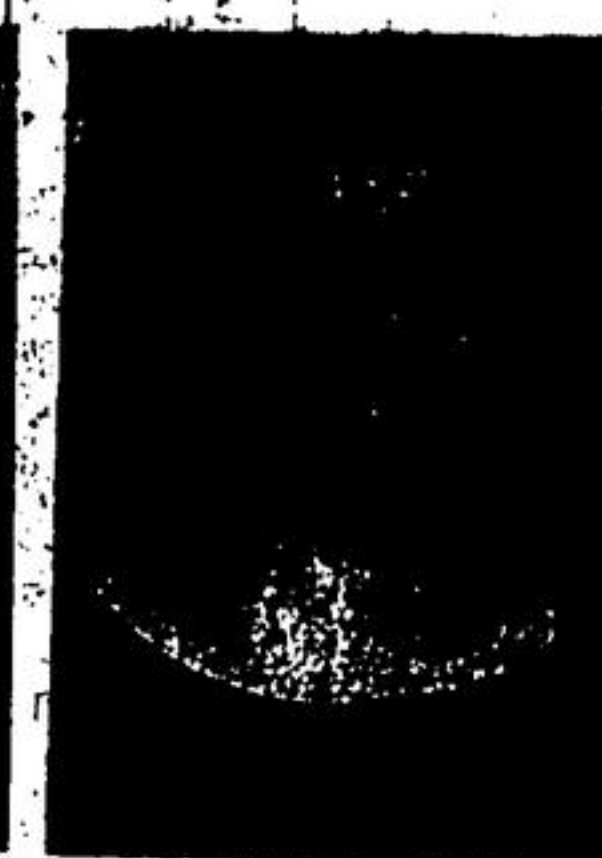
