Esqueuing Chairman
Will Seek Board Seat

William Lawson, Esqueuing
Township's public school board
chairman, has declared himself
a candidate for the first Halton
County Board of Education
which will take over adminis-
tration of all public and high
schools in the county in Janu-
ary. He is the first to seek Es-
queuing's only seat on the
board.

Before taking the chairman's
position this year, Mr. Lawson
served for two years as vice-
chairman and has in all six
years on the board. Prior to
this he was for seven years
secretary-treasurer for SS 'No
2 Esqueuing.

An R.R. 5, Milton resident
Mr. Lawson is the current op-
erator of a farm that has been
in the Lawson name for over a
century.

As Esqueuing representative
on the Interim School Organi-
zation Committee he is serving as
a member of the publicity
group.

"I feel my continuing interest
in education would be useful on
the new board, as well as my
experience and participation on
ISOC" he told the Herald.

To date, only one man, Geor-
getown Public School chairman
Gudni Sigurdson, has announ-
ced his candidacy for the Geor-
getown seat on the county
board. Elections will be Decem-
ber 2.

Pathologist Dr. P. R. Garrod
of Oakville, who conducted au-
topsies on the victims at Oak-
ville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospi-
tal testified alcohol found in
their blood would be sufficient
to impair each man involved.

Steering Column

He said both Morden and Mal-
oney died from ruptures to the
main arteries leading to their
hearts — "A very common kind
of killing injury when the steer-
ing column is pressed against
the chest." Hunter led from
severe third degree burns and
lived only a short while suffi-
cient to inhale some smoke.

David Armstrong, a Geor-
getown mechanic who examined
the vehicles after the accident
said he found no sign of mech-
anical damage that might have
happened prior to the collision.
He said there appeared to be
no failure as a result of exces-
sively worn parts on either
vehicles.

The jury found that the vic-
tims died from causes outlined
by the pathologist. It recom-
mended that slow, dangerous
curve signs be placed at both
the north and south ends of the
corner to give ample warning to
drivers approaching the bend.
