

Danger Signs Mandatory — 'Home Made' Not Legal

Since September 1, all farm tractors and self-propelled farm implements or any vehicle drawn by them must carry the Slow Moving Vehicle sign when operating on a highway. Because of the heavy demand for these signs, farmers have not been able to obtain as many as required. One sign can meet the

requirements. It can be fitted to a movable clamp and placed on the back of the tractor or combination of vehicles when on the highway.

It must be located not less than three feet or more than five feet from the roadway.

Some farmers have considered building their own S.M.V. signs

According to the regulations of the Highway Traffic Act each sign must be marked with the stamp of the Canadian Standards Association Testing Laboratories. It also must be clearly visible for a distance of not less than 500 feet, and bonded to a durable weather-proof base surface. This tends to rule out home made signs.

Took Pep Pills Before Hornby Store Stick-Up

A search for his common law wife led to a young Toronto man's appearance in Magistrate's Court last week on two charges of armed robbery and a charge of kidnapping.

The accused, a clerk with a high superior IQ of 120, pleaded guilty to all these charges. Magistrate Kenneth Langdon remanded him to October 21 for a presentence report and psychiatric reports.

The bizarre story of how the red-haired young man took pep pills to keep awake and then went off on an armed robbery and kidnapping spree with an unloaded shotgun began last May 20th.

He told the court he seldom slept after June 5th, when he marched into Mrs. Bob Crawford's Hornby store with a shotgun intending to buy cigarettes, but came out with \$100 instead.

He held Mrs. Crawford and three customers at bay with the shotgun, and when the woman suggested he was joking, he struck a customer over the eye with the gun as "he either made a bee-line for me or the door."

He was seen leaving the store with the gun by Harold Pickett, of R R 1, Hornby, who followed him on a motorcycle while Francis S. Barr, of Milton, took down the license number of his car and called the police.

Constable Paul Jordan of the North Halton OPP testified he lost track of the accused until police were called by Mrs. Irene Burd of R R 1, Moffat. She flagged a car down on Hwy. 401 but the driver took off when he heard her story. She stopped another car and was taken to a service station where she telephoned police.

He went on to steal two other cars but a passing motorist noticed him holding the gun on

High School Guidance Officer - Al Prouse, Speaks to B & P

Alan Prouse, Guidance Director at the Georgetown & District High School, was the guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Business and Professional Women's Club on Monday evening at North-Halton Golf & Country Club.

He stated that guidance starts in grades nine and ten, first with helping the student become oriented to the change from public school to high school and helping them choose which of the seven courses available to them, they will be best suited to. This is done by personal interviews; each student is interviewed at least once and given, if requested by the student or parents, more interviews. Some students in rare cases will have as many as sixteen. Usually these students are those whose parents are not interested in helping them or those who have no parents or anyone to help them with their problems.

He emphasized that to date no tests had been found that are completely sure proof that a certain student would be most suited for any particular career. Particularly since there are at present, approximately 30,000 careers available in Canada and more in the United States, he said that it is possible that each student can possibly make a successful career out of at least one hundred of these.

Mr. Prouse said that counselling was mainly interested in guiding the student to make his own choice and to locate his own job, not to do it for him. In other words to help them find themselves. This is done by interviews, making all sorts of career literature available to them and several different kinds of tests as to interest, achievement, aptitude, etc. Mrs. Eva Presswood expressed the thanks and appreciation of the club and presented him with a gift.

Mrs. Presswood accepted the office of recording secretary, substituting for Mrs. Margaret Parker who is taking additional courses and cannot fill her position.

URGING FARMERS TO APPEAL ASSESSMENT

Halton Federation of Agriculture is encouraging members to appeal their own assessment if necessary.

Harold Middlebrook, chairman of a special select committee set up by the federation recently, said this week the committee decided to ask members to personally appeal their assessment after a meeting with its lawyer yesterday.

Halton farmers registered their objections to the new assessment policies at a recent meeting here.

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Most farmers have received their assessment notices and they have 14 days in which to appeal. The county court of revision will notify farmers when their hearings have been set. If they still are not satisfied with their assessment they may appeal before the county judge and finally, if necessary, before the Ontario Municipal Board.

Middlebrook said the committee will keep a list of farmers who file appeals and they can contact the committee for further information.
