Three pass interceptions and three fumbles took the sting out of Georgetown Rebels' attack and enabled Guelph C.V.I. to board their buses with a 14-6 victory Monday afternoon.

The win gave GCVI six points and first place in the district ten senior football league. Georgetown has a win and two losses.

Gael's struck early, scoring a touchdown on a reverse that Paul Christie worked to perfection from 82 yards out. The missed convert left it 6-0 after just three minutes.

Rebels retaliated in the first quarter when Ron Stewart's pass to Barry Cook took the 15 yards to the Guelph 10. On the next play Rick Peavoy cracked up the middle for the TD. The convert was blocked.

Guelph rebounded in the second quarter with an option pass from Calhoun to Bernie Law that went for a 47 yard touchdown. Again a flying body got in the way of the convert attempt.

Rebels threatened late in the half but their thrust died with a lost fumble.

Neither team could figure the other's defence in the second half. The only scoring play was a safety touch chalked up when a Guelph blitzed downed Reb quarterback Ron Stewart in his end zone. Georgetown went to the air in the late stages but interceptions snuffed their drives.

Silver Spur Ranch, the western playground north of Georgetown that never quite made it has been converted to a private holiday home.

Fred Caruk, 52, of Port Credit snapped up the property complete with old west Main Street in a bankruptcy sale, and has winterized the general store to make it livable year round. The parcel of land includes 86 acres of rolling parkland.

Caruk said the western street, which looks like a ghost town, cost about \$35,000 to build, but he declined to say what he had paid for it.

The dozen or more buildings that line the street include a two-storey hotel, restaurant, blacksmith's shop, gun smith's, shoofling gallery, law and doctor's offices, and a jail.

There's a hitching rail and a wooden pump beside the wooden sidewalks.

And just beyond is boot hill where cowboys' boots are embedded in the gravestones.

The site also includes three large teepees, each 20 feet in diameter.

The layout has a modern 40 by 20 foot swimming pool, nine feet deep at one end, and another round wading pool 25 feet across.

When Fred and his wife take a holiday, he puts on his authentic western gear as mayor and sheriff and she wears her ten gallon hat. It's a rest from the noise of his wedding shop in Port Credit.

The hideaway is on a country sidewalk, west of Ballinfad.
