Kinsmen Telegram Censures Government's Biafra Policy

Georgetown Kinsmen have sent a telegram to Prime Minister Trudeau, the Minister of External Affairs Mitchell Sharp, and Halton Member of Parliament Rud Whiting censuring the government's "ineffective measures" in response to the Biafra crisis, and urging "help while there is still time."

The club voted to send the telegram at their meeting Monday night.

"We hope to arouse similar organizations to do likewise in the hope that the weight of public opinion will convince the government to act in a positive manner," a spokesman told The Herald.

The telegram read as follows:

"The members of the Kinsmen Club of Georgetown are extremely concerned with the plight of the people of Biafra and deplore the relatively ineffective measures taken by our government to assure that food and medicine is delivered where it is needed. We urgently request that steps be taken to eliminate the red tape restricting this help while there is still time. We are sure that all Canadians share our desire for immediate and effective action."

The resolution that the telegram be sent was moved by Ken Milne and seconded by Trevor Moores.

The action came during the business portion of "past members' night," a special dinner held

McCAIG BACK AGAIN

Branding safely "as it is dealt with by this council," a farce, Jim McCaig, Maple Avenue W., attacked council and particularly the mayor, for lack of action Monday night.

He charged that a child had to die before a by-law dated 1962 was found to cover the situation. "You, this council, are responsible," he went on, "I hope you think of this when you get into your warm bed tonight," he concluded.

In obvious anger, Cr. William Smith stated he was shocked that any ratepayer could come and accuse council of such a responsibility.

"I hope I never have to listen in such garbage again," he added.

The Bus Game: Move Back To Main and Miss a Turn

Another chapter in the continuing story of the bus routes was enacted at Monday's council meeting.

At the moment, it seems that the buses will return to Main Street, using the two meter spaces north of Wesleyan St., on one side, and two meter spaces north and south of the alley leading to the municipal parking lot on the other side.

Over the objections of Cr. Roy Ballentine and Mayor Gibson, this complicated motion was passed: "that the clerk be authorized to write Gray Coach Lines and advise them that insofar as the Parking Authority and the municipal council have decided to move the bus stop back onto Main Street, and the locations of said bus stops have been approved by Gray Coach Lines, the council is now requesting a firm date in writing, saying when the company are prepared to start using Main St. route, and the approved loading and unloading zones."

Cr. Ballentine recalled the last word from Gray Coach said they could not park in the length of two meters.

The mayor reminded council there are no sidewalks on Main Street South, a street used frequently by school children.

He claimed the parking authority is not unanimous in this decision, and that Gray Coach said two meters was not enough space. "The Parking Authority says no more space or the merchants' customers will have no place to park," added the mayor.

"No matter where we put the buses we'll step on somebody's toes," commented Cr. John Hole. "We've pussyfooted around here eight months. If there are any more problems I'll urge the buses go on Guelph Street," he concluded.

"Gray Coach will probably refuse to go back on Main St. anyway," added the mayor.

The vote showed only the mayor, and Cr. Ballentine opposed.
