Whiting asked health and welfare minister John Munro of Hamilton if his department was waging an all-out war on the use of drugs.

Whiting noted that young people are experimenting with drugs, particularly mind-expanding drugs, and he said they are using these drugs without realizing the serious effects.

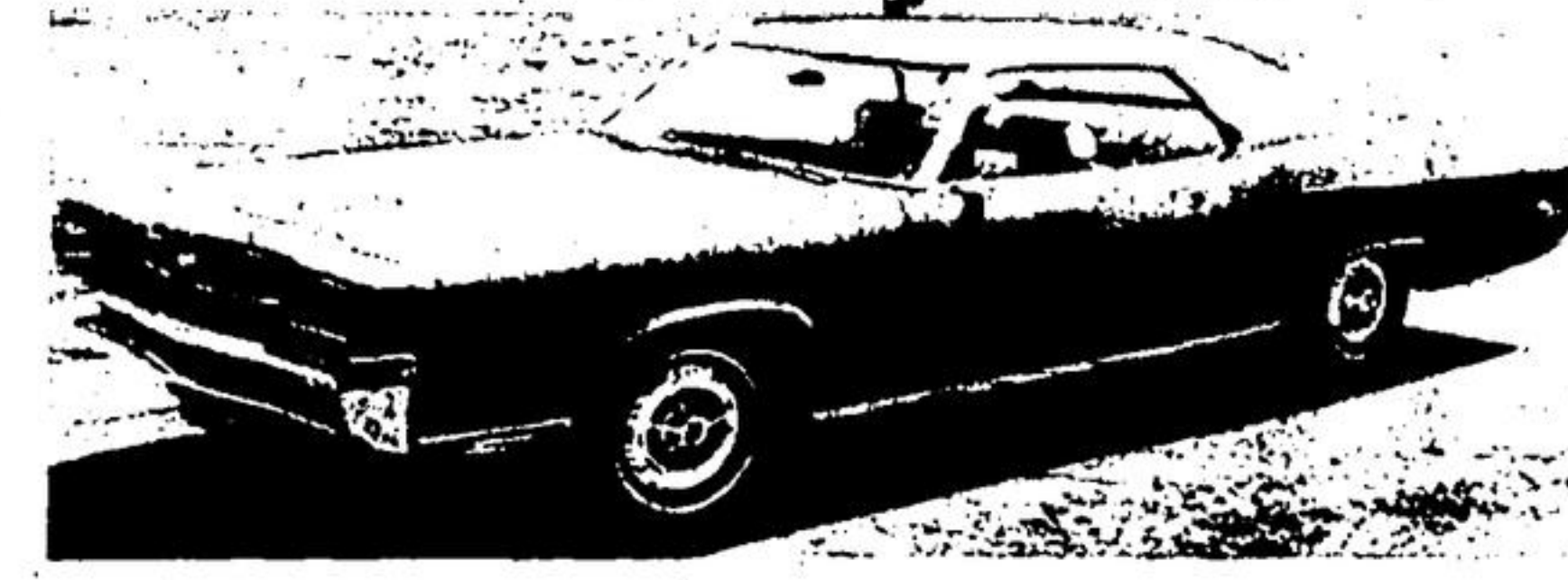
"What is the department doing to educate the young people and is serious consideration being given to the using of modern communications techniques such as films and television programs?" Whiting asked.
