

## Label Printing is New Operation At the Expanding Dennison Plant

The recently opened Georgetown plant at Dennison Manufacturing on Todd Road has already taken up additional importance in the company's plans for expanding Ontario business.

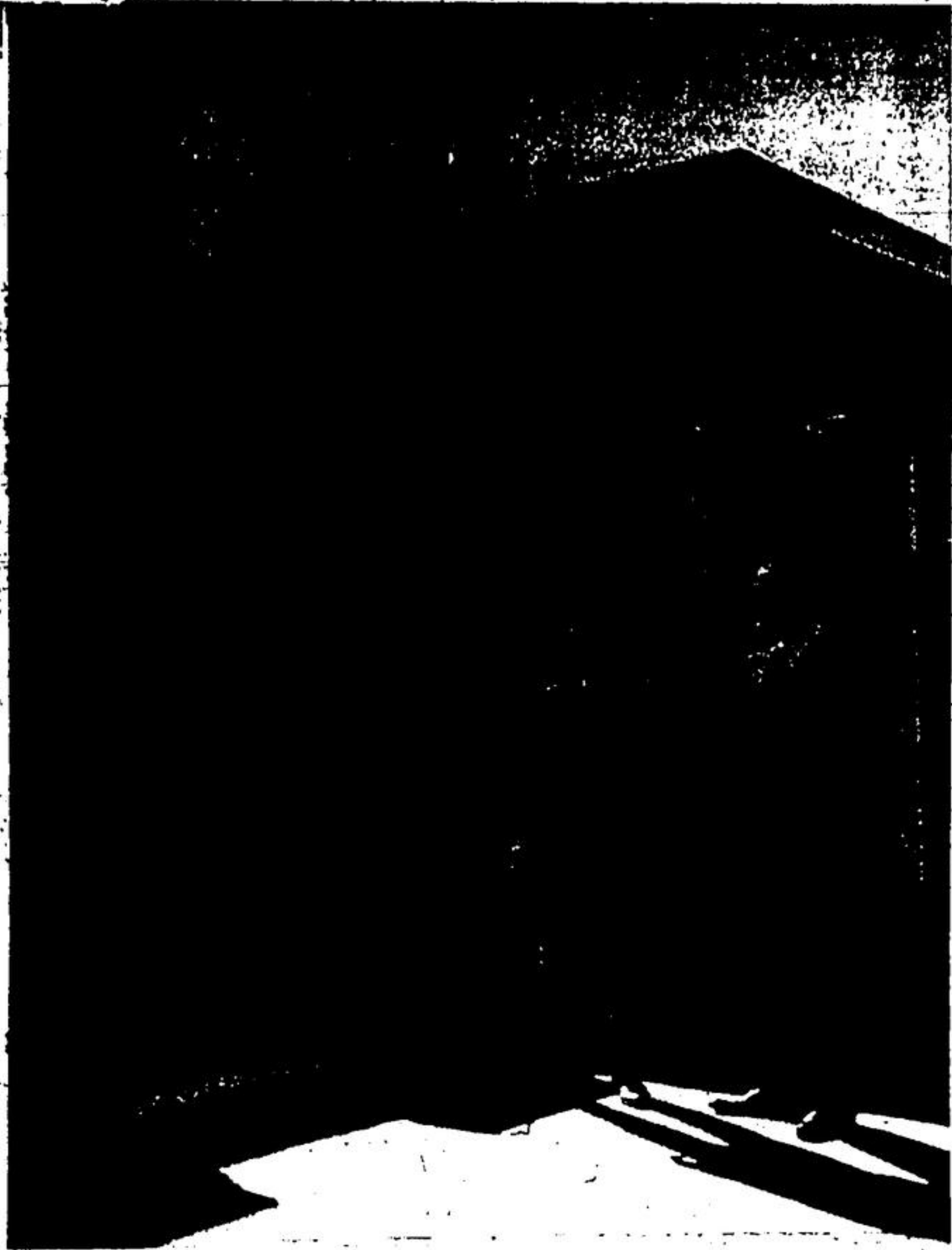
According to Mr. James Innes, Merchandise Manager for the Industrial Products Division of Dennison, the plant had originally been built mainly as a warehousing operation to supply goods manufactured at the company's main Drummondville, Quebec, plant.

"However, we soon found that an expanding market for our Dennison-Copier, manufactured in the U.S., required additional warehouse space, which we were able to utilize at Georgetown," he said. "But that was only the beginning. Increased demand for our made-to-order merchandise in the Ontario market made us consider the idea of installing manufacturing facilities, particularly for the quality label and quality contract packaging market. The result has been the installation of one of the most modern printing facilities in the country, with the complete air-conditioning and dust-free conditions required by this type of operation."

Mr. Innes pointed out that the operation was becoming a duplicate of the Drummondville facilities, thus ensuring two sources of supply for customers in Canada and is expected to contribute to the rapidly expanding economy of the area. The operation is headed up by plant manager Allan J. McCormick.

A native of Drummondville, Quebec, where the company's main plant is located, Mr. McCormick joined Dennison in 1954 after working for ten years with Canadian Celanese in various departments including accounting, textile and control and development. At Dennison he headed the time study department, which later became the industrial engineering department, setting up the Standards Program, the incentive and job classification systems. Office services were later added to his responsibilities and, in the last four years, he headed up industrial relations as well.

Mr. McCormick has been active in community work in Drummondville, serving as vice-president and interim president of the Hospital for the Chronically Ill. He is first vice-president of the Employing Printers Association of Quebec and a member of the Montreal Printing Trade Parity Committee. He was a member of the Drummondville Toastmaster Club and the Drummondville Investment Club. He is married, with three children.

## Cable Television Extends Business to Milton Area

Georgetown Cable Television Company last week received the green light for taking cable television to Milton — but not before town council had a recorded vote on the issue.

A resolution giving the company permission to establish and operate the system, subject to satisfactory agreements with town council and Milton Hydro, was approved 53 on a recorded vote requested by Cr. Charles Fay.

"I seconded the motion, but I don't feel we should have a firm digging up our streets," Fay said.

Deputy Reeve Ron Harris, who brought in the motion, said the firm probably won't have to dig up any streets, but if it does, it will pay the full cost. The

company plans to use existing hydro facilities for the system.

Harris said the company will invest about \$80,000 in the system, and council should not discourage any business from investing that kind of money in the town.

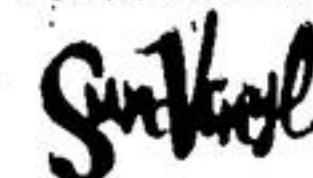
