Opening lead—jack of diamonds.
Even the best players occasionally suffer from blind spots, as evidenced by this hand from a match between Austria and Great Britain.

The British West overcalled South's heart bid with a spade, which North doubled. Well aware that his opening bid was under par in high cards, South ran to two clubs, which North corrected to two hearts.

The bidding would probably have died right there had East passed, but he understandably competed with two spades. North-South then proceeded to four hearts, which East doubled.

Declarer won the diamond lead with the ace, entered dummy with a heart to the king, and discarded his spade loser on the king of diamonds. He then led a club from dummy.

East went up with the king and returned the queen of hearts. Declarer won with the ace, ruffed a club in dummy and discarded a club on the queen of diamonds, but still had to lose two clubs and a trump for down one.

It is plain to see that in his anxiety to escape a spade loser, South erred by leading a trump to the king. He was bidden to the effect this play would have on the hand as a whole. He saved the spade loser, all right, but it cost him the contract.

Declarer should have recognized that the K-Q of diamonds could serve just as well later on for club discards, and that avoiding a spade loser was not really the crux of the matter. His trump lead to the king opened the avenue for a second trump lead by East that proved fatal.

When the British North-South pair played four hearts against the same opening lead, declarer did not suffer from this illusion. He led a low club at trick two and could not be prevented from ruffing two clubs in dummy and discarding two more on the K-Q of diamonds. The only tricks he lost were a spade, a heart, and a club.

So I asked Alex Agnew, the head meat man to give me a meat lesson. And this is what I learned:
Inspected meat and meat products are stamped or labeled by government inspectors with an official stamp—a crown in the centre and the words "Canada Approved" or "Canada".
There are several grades for beef. The main grades are:

Meat is graded on:
• Conformation—proportion of meat to bone.
• Amount, quality and colour of fat covering.
• Proportion and distribution of fat in the meat.
• Firmness, texture and colour of meat.
• Condition and maturity of bone.
