LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

 Experts at the game of bridge, and some non-experts, are always trying out new ideas in bidding turning little used bids into new meaning or changing the strength requirements for a certain bid.
 After a period of trial, usually a couple of years, these new ideas are accepted by most bridge players, forgotten about or used by a small group of adherents to a certain system.
 One bid in the first category is the 'unusual no trump bid.' After its trial period, it was widely accepted by the duplicate playing public.
 It is most unusual for a person to overcall the opponents in no trump when the opponents have been bidding strongly. This could be a courting disaster if you really meant to play the hand at no trump. This being a useless bid, it was given a new meaning. Ten no trump overcall at a high level or as a jump was used as a takeout bid. Partner must bid his best minor suit.
 The following hand, which occurred at the Acton Bridge Club, will illustrate its use.
 East dealt and East-West were vulnerable.
 NORTH
 S—Void
 H—A 9 8 7 5 2

 The bidding:
 EAST SOUTH WEST NORTH
 1 NT Pass 4 S 3 NT
 Dble. 5 C Pass Pass
 Dble. All Pass
 Opening lead: A♠ of spades.
 East's opening of 1 no trump was, in my books, atrocious. Yet it was made by one of our better players. No trump bids show shape (distribution) as well as points. West's leap to four spades is a good bid.
 North does not wish to double since he is not sure of setting four spades. In fact four spades can make. North does not wish to give up without a fight. Although he cannot offer good support for the minor suits, he uses the 'unusual no trump.' This his partner takes out, as requested, to five clubs.
 Although intended as a sacrifice, North-South expect to go down a trick or two, five points is made. After ruffing 6♠, the spade ace, declarer led a trump.
