## Four Kin to Attend District Fall Council

### Says Powell Should Be Olympic Team Member

In a recent edition of the Ontario Track Monthly, editor Chris Pickard said publicly what a lot of people have been thinking since the selection of the Canadian Olympic team for the Mexico games, "why is Georgetown's Tony Powell not a member of the 1600 Metre relay team?"

In an editorial headed "Olympic Prospects" Pickard wrote: "Several readers have indicated their disappointment about the exclusion of Tony Powell from Canada's 1600 Metre relay team. Powell had finished third in the final of the 400 Metres at the trials, and it is argued, has never been defeated by either Brian or Bob McLaren, both of whom were named to the Olympic Squad."

Tony was chosen to the Pan Am Games Canadian team after beating Brian McLaren in the trials, but was unfortunately unable to take part. With McLaren in Tony's place, Canada earned a silver medal in the 1600 Metre relay that time.

Tony, together with Bill Crothers, shared the East York Track Club Trophy for Most Outstanding Athlete of the Year.

This past summer as a member of the Canadian team in Europe, Tony was lead off man in the 1600 Metre relay in Norway and the Canadians finished first. In the 400 Metre relay in Sweden he ran in the anchor position and the Canadians were first again. In the 200 Metres he finished with the same time as winner Ross Mackenzie, 21.4 seconds.

"One is forced to ask," says Pickard, "what would Powell have had to do to make the 1600 Metre relay team?"

Four Georgetown Kinamen, Dean Taylor, Harry Levy, George Mielon and Fred Harrison will represent the local club at the district fall council meeting of Kinsmen Clubs in Windsor, Saturday, October 26.

Dick Rendek of Montreal, national president of the Association of Kinsmen Clubs will attend the council at which governor Bill Stewart of Kitchener and his executive will outline their program for the ensuing year.

The association is composed of some 13,000 members in over 420 clubs throughout Canada and to date has donated more than \$30 million to service work. This fall a dream will come true for Kinsmen members across Canada when construction begins on 1.5 acres of land at York University where the "Kinsmen National Institute on Mental Retardation" will stand.

## 13th Double Trouble For This Motorist

The 13th doesn't have to fall on a Friday to be a bad day as far as David Arthur Stanton of Brampton is concerned.

Sunday, October 13, he collided with the back end of a car driven by Robert Bingham, of Selkirk, Manitoba, on Main St. South, and moments later, a little farther down the road, tangled with a car driven by Ivor F. Tibbits of R.R. 1, Malton.

As a result of the second collision Stanton suffered a bump on his forehead, Vivian De Georgio, also of Brampton suffered lacerations and Tibbits received a bruised left knee.

Police said damage in the first accident amounted to \$100 to \$170. It was investigated by Bingham's car and the same

amount to Stanton's. In the second smash it was \$600 to Stanton's and \$1200 to Tibbits.

The accidents happened around 8:30 p.m. and were both investigated by Constable Jim Powell.

The only other major accident investigated by Georgetown police on the weekend happened Saturday on John Street West near Guelph Street where cars operated by Everett Arthur Wilson of 41 Victoria St. and Ronald Alan Knight of R.R. 2, Georgetown came together. Police said the Wilson car hit a pole before hitting the other car.
