

## Burl-Oak City Combine Would Follow Plunkett Recommendation

Former Halton County Warden William Coulter says if Burlington and Oakville want to become a new city area they can go right ahead.

"But they had better remember one thing," Coulter warned. "They've gone right along with what Plunkett said."

Municipal expert Thomas Plunkett proposed Oakville and Burlington join with South Peel to become a lakeshore super city stretching from Hamilton to Toronto in a report on regional government for Halton & Peel counties.

Coulter said city status for the two towns would leave North Halton no other alternative than to join with North Peel in a rural unit, exactly what Plunkett suggested in his 1966 report.

Coulter who was warden in 1967, said it would be fine with him if the two towns break

away from the rest of the county. "It would leave us with a much more workable unit," he said.

For example, he said representation on the new Halton County Board of Education favors the two big southern municipalities and if those in the north had control over their own education programs they would be better off.

Now Reeve of Nassagaweya Township, Coulter said, Halton County is a 'compact unit' and for the sake of continuity could be adapted easily to a regional government system along county lines.

Current Halton warden William Hunter of Georgetown took a different view of the situation.

"I think the powers that be at Queen's Park will have quite a bit to say about all this," said Hunter.

## PLAN NEGOTIATIONS FOR NURSES' NEW CONTRACT

Negotiations for a new contract to cover Halton's 17 health unit nurses may begin within two weeks.

Mrs. Mary Anne Bulmer, president of the Nurses' Association said yesterday the negotiations will be handled by Toronto lawyer Gerald Cherny. Also taking part will be Mrs. Bulmer, elected president after Flora Hesson left the county health unit to do post graduate work at Dalhousie University.

The nurses' current one year contract expires in December. Halton's public health nurses tied up services throughout the county when they walked off the job in 1966. They returned

only after "greystriking" the health unit, preventing it from hiring any more nurses until a new contract was settled. The

current contract was agreed upon in October, 1967.

As the strike wore on many nurses quit, leaving the Halton unit short-handed. The situation has still not been remedied. The unit is currently operating with about 19 less than recommended for a county the size of Halton.

Efforts to amalgamate the Halton and Peel units have so far failed, with Peel officials spurning advances by the local unit.
