

Jersey Shipment First to Peru

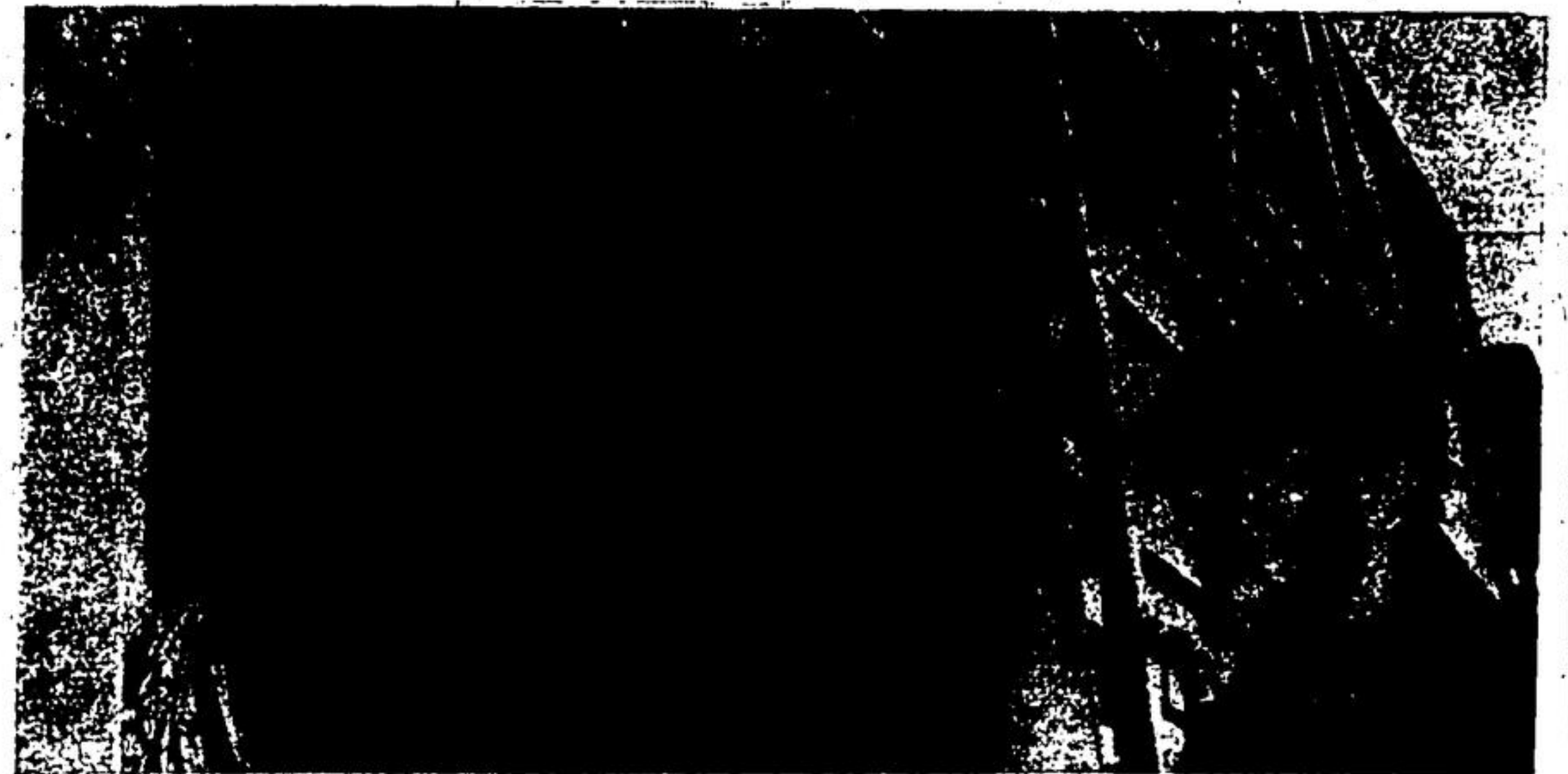
Three hundred and fifty Jersey cattle shipped from the Georgetown Sales Arena on the 7th line just west of town will be the first Jerseys ever to appear in Peru, according to general manager Emil Ohliver.

These cattle, part of a 500-cattle shipment, left here Saturday on an eighteen day trip to Lima, Peru. The whole shipment left Montreal, Wednesday. In Lima, they will be held in quarantine thirty days, before

leaving for their various homes where Jerseys will be bred for the first time.

Apart from being the first Jerseys in Peru, they are also the first large shipment of Jerseys from Canada to South America.

That Rockwood International is making a name for itself is shown by the fact these cattle came from all over, Ontario from Sarnia to Ottawa, and by a larger order of Jerseys to the same destination in December.

However, the Blades came out battling in the third period to out-score the Raiders 2-1 and knot the game 4-4.
