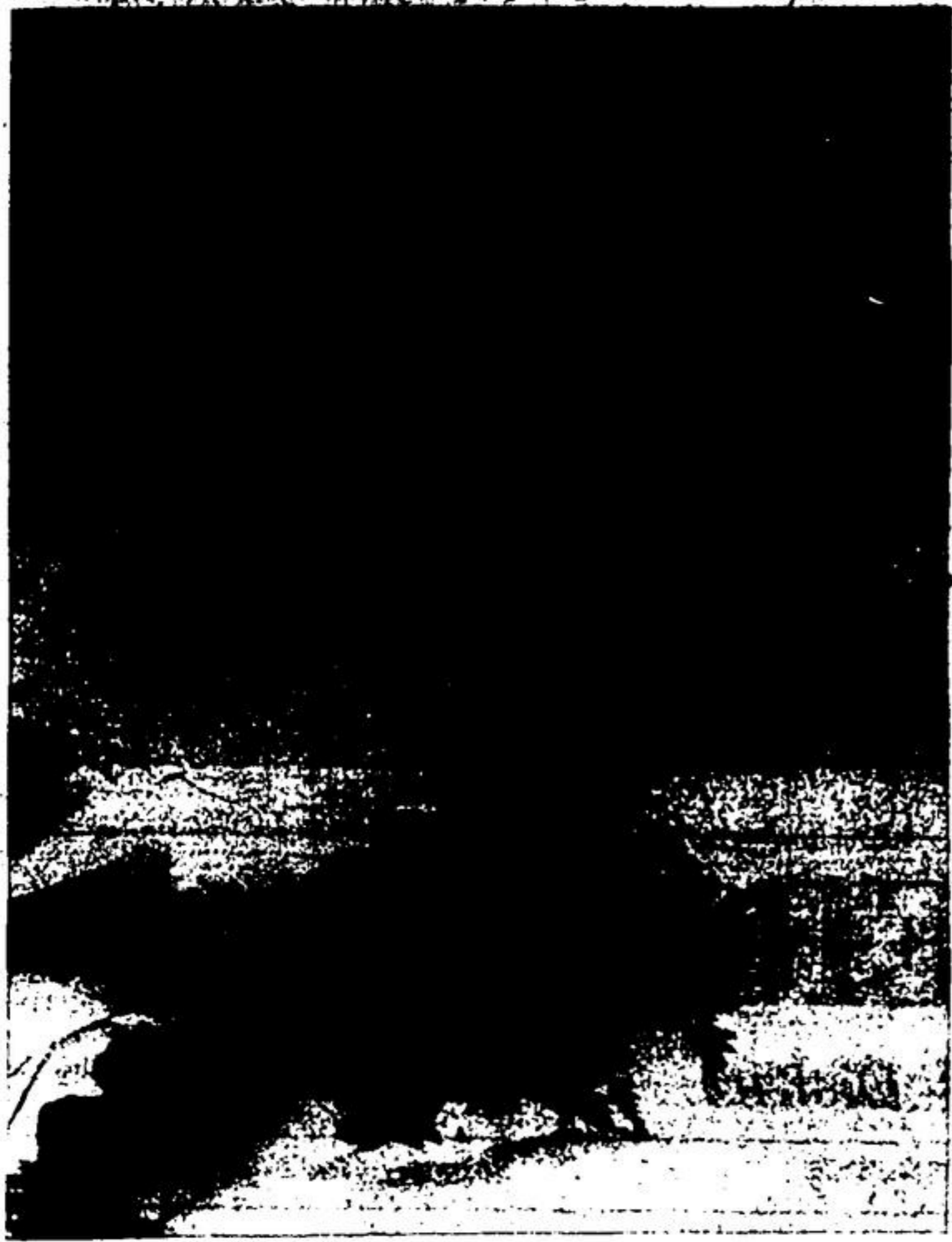


# Bennett-Turnbull Wedding in Maple Baptist Church

### Cubs Tour Haida, See Tor. - Dom. Centre

Twenty two cubs from the 8th Georgetown 'B' Pack went to Toronto on October 26th to see the destroyer Haida.

The cubs toured the whole ship and were allowed to work the blinker lights, turn the large guns and had a trip below into the engine room.

HMCS Haida served in World War 2 on the Мурманek convoy run and in 1945 joined the 10th destroyer flotilla. She is credited with sinking 35 enemy vessels and damaging 14 others. In 1919 her crew rescued 18 American airmen from a crashed B29 in mid-Atlantic. The ship made two Korean tours in 1952, bombarding communist rail traffic.

Ending an active career in 1963, the Haida was rechristened and is now open to the public in Toronto harbour.

The boys then visited the Toronto-Dominion Centre, but owing to overcast skies did not have as good a view of the city as they had hoped.

The last paragraph of the proposal stated the town would implement the necessary Official Plan and Zoning By-law changes, and pass a by-law necessary to carry out the intent of this proposal.

In conclusion, the developer pointed out the proposal intended to put no capital debt on the town.

**BEEN PATIENT**  
Following the formal proposal, Bruce McLaughlin remarked they had been patient. "Twenty two months is a considerable length of time," he opined.

"The number one reason for high price of homes today is the inability of municipalities to move fast," he maintained, "it costs more money than anyone realizes. We understand their problem in raising the levy since it is based on property tax alone," he added.

"We sincerely believe our proposal overcomes this problem," he concluded.
