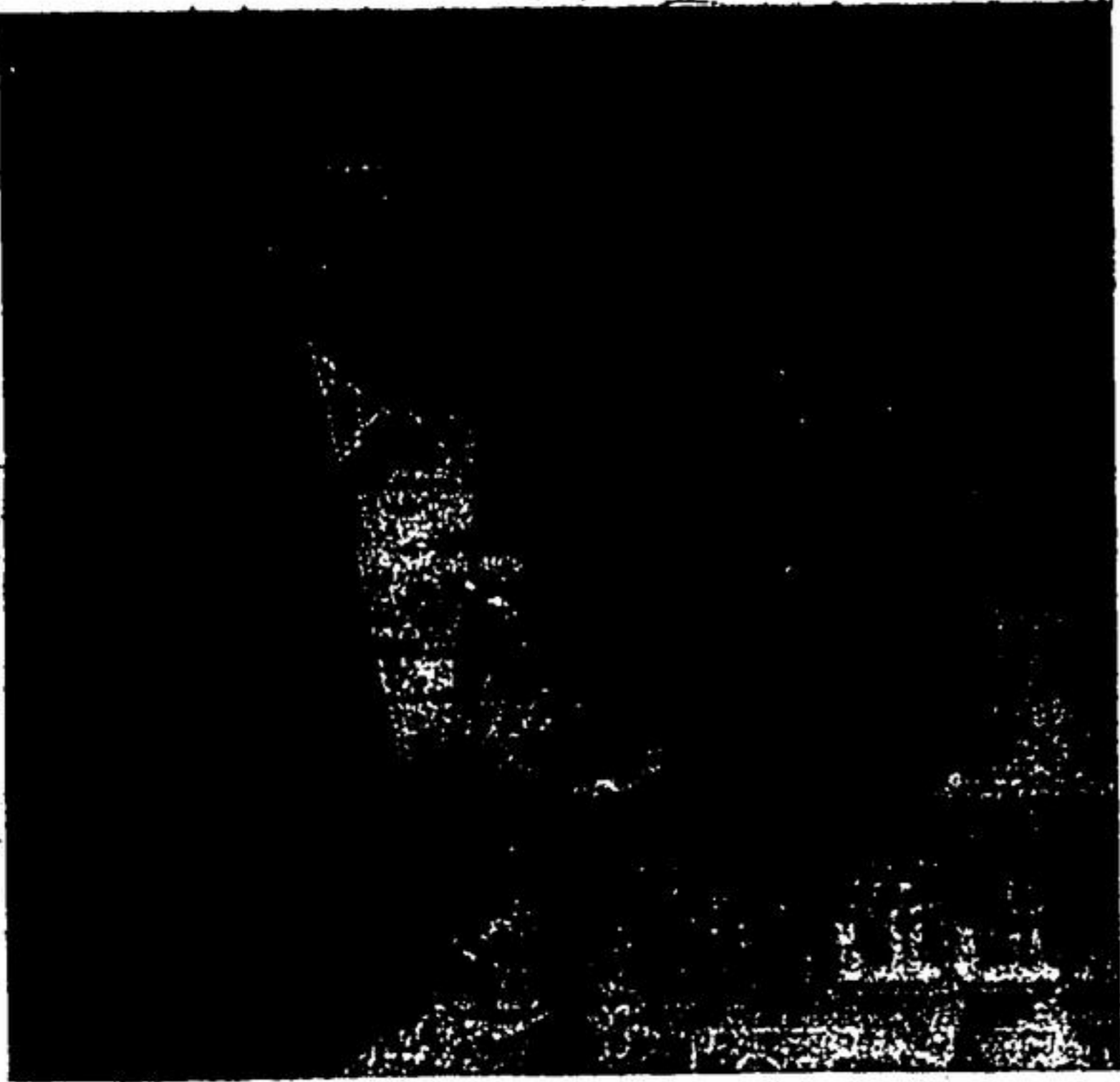


### Mr. and Mrs. C. Oosterhof Honeymoon in Florida

## Cancer Fund Contributions Helped New Hospital Wing

Alex Berzloch, president of the local Canadian Cancer Society Branch presided at the annual meeting of the Society in St. John's United Church hall, Wednesday October 23. In his opening remarks Mr. Berzloch reviewed the progress made by the Branch during the past three years, congratulating the captains and canvassers on "going over the top" on the past campaign, and thanking Ken Hopper, campaign chairman for his tremendous effort.

Funds from the campaign were used for the new wing of the Princess Margaret Hospital and it is believed that it is now the best equipped hospital of this type in the world.

Mr. Berzloch introduced the guest speaker Jess Erickson after a prayer by Rev. Robert Scrivens.

Mr. Erickson's main topics were fund raising and education plans. He stated that not too many years ago it was sufficient to meet the needs of these few who were available. The picture has now changed and there are many qualified research people and that it is now difficult to keep pace with sufficient funds to meet their needs for the wonderful progressive work they are doing.

In the education department

he stated that there was going to be a new approach to this field. Apparently after four surveys it became apparent that people were appreciating the education along the lines of the seven danger signals to watch for, but that the majority of them were afraid still to approach their doctor. The plan now in education is to convince people of the many advantages of seeing their doctor for check ups. It has been proved that a large percentage of cancer could be prevented if people would have regular checkups. The theme will be the elimination of fear "Cancer can be beaten."

The president presented an efficiency award of merit to Ken Hopper for his handling of the campaign funds. Mrs. Arbie Arton Branch, was also presented with a corresponding award for her work. Mrs. Craig Reid received a sterling silver caduceus in recognition of her work in home services. At the moment her project is the remodeling of donated gentlemen's white shirts into Johnny coats for the Princess Margaret Hospital. Mrs. Barry Timleck received a caduceus in recognition of her work as Transport Chairman. She reported that her drivers had made 106 trips to various treatment hospitals and had

travelled over 9250 miles during the past year. Mrs. Aileen Bradley received the award for her work in publicity. Each driver and each campaign captain and canvasser either received the award at the meeting or will have it mailed to them.

Mr. Erickson took the chair for the election of officers, which are as follows: Mr. Berzloch, president; Ken Hopper, vice president; and campaign chairman for 1969; Mrs. Craig Reid, at home services; Mrs. Timleck, transportation; Mrs. L. Clark, treasurer; Mrs. Janet Wickett secretary.

Mrs. Timleck, Mrs. B. Emond and Mrs. N. Bell are heading a newly formed committee which will meet with the canvassers and explain to the next fund raising campaign for education at work sessions to compare and work out various problems encountered.
