

Football Season Ends with Junior Rebs Win, Sr. Loss

The District 10 regular schedule ended Friday afternoon for the Georgetown Rebels and GCVI Green Gaels. The Junior Rebs ended one of their best years with a 24-0 romp of the Junior Green while the GCVI Seniors used the last day in the schedule as a warmup for this week's game against Gall with a 27-7 trouncing of the Senior Rebs.

After Barry Cock had run Steve Eston's punt to the 39, Rebels used four plays to get the touchdown by Al Francis on a two-yard plunge. The big play to put the ball on the two was a 50-yard gallop by Rick Peavoy on a counter play. The convert attempt was wide.

On the last play of the first quarter a bad snap sailed over the head of Cock, who was back to punt. When he fumbled, Rick Goodchild fell on the ball at the Rebel 32. Eston grabbed a screen pass from Christie and got to the 15 for a 17-yard gain but the Rebel defence held and took over on their own 15-yard line.

Another fumble late in the second quarter by Peavoy was recovered by Bev Preator on the Georgetown 34. The Green offence made no mistake this time as Bernie Law took the ball to the one via a wide sweep and then Chris Calheart plunged over for the major. An offside by GCVI nullified the convert.

Georgetown started a final drive before the half but Larry Thatcher who played a strong game on defence had other thoughts. He hauled in a Stewart screen pass and raced 40 yards for the touchdown. The convert was wide and at half time the score stood at 12-0 for the Green and White.

The Rebels opened the second half with a potent ground attack which saw them get to the Green three yard line where the drive stalled. Bill Sykes came in to attempt a field goal but it was wide although it went for a single point.

On the last play of the quarter Goodchild again pounced on a Cock fumble and ran 30 yards to the 10 where he was finally brought down. Opening the quarter, Christie threw to Thatcher for the touchdown. Eston kicked the single and the score now stood at 19-7 for GCVI.

defense tightened up and stopped the Gaels on three successive downs to end the quarter.

The last scoring play came late in the game as Chris Todd intercepted a Millard pass and

ran to the Gaels seven. Todd then proceeded to score the touchdown in two plays. There was offside on the convert which nullified the point making the final score 24-0 in favour of the Georgetown Rebels.

To open the second quarter Rebels had the ball on their own four yard line. They then proceeded to pass and run the ball with Blair throwing to Bob Allison for a total of 30 yards while Bob Sargent ran another 28 for the score. Blair tried to run the convert in but was pugged out of bounds. This ended the half with the score 12-0 for Georgetown.

The Gaels received the opening kick-off, but as the case was all day, they failed to move the ball. Rod Millard punted to Bob Inglis who ran to the Green 53. Blair carried 17 yards to the Gaels 36 and Blair to Larry Louth pass put the ball on the 26 where Sargent scored in three running plays. The convert was missed again.






