

Georgetown Returns to Intermediate Hockey

Georgetown will return to the ranks of intermediate hockey this season. A delegation from here got the nod from the IHA and Central Intermediate League officials at a meeting in Harrison Monday night to make the birth of intermediate hockey here official.

The Georgetown entry, which will be the junior team, will call itself "The Raiders." It will play Friday night hockey right in Georgetown since they have applied for and received ice time in the once-popular Friday night time slot.

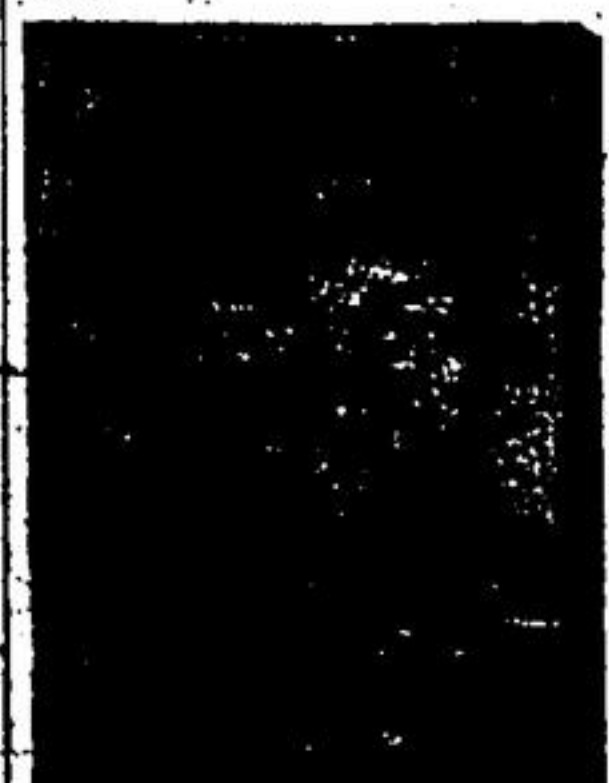
In their own Southern group the intermediate Raiders will play against Ferguson, Heslop, Bramalea, and Arton plus interlocking games with the Northern group teams, Elmira, Seabrook, Lucan, Durham and Port Hope.

Georgetown's first home game will be Friday, November 15. Their full schedule includes 26 games.

Gerry Inglis, Bud James, Ayres and Will Brownlow represented Georgetown at the Harrison meeting. A stipulation is that, because of the town's population, Georgetown may use only home brews and play Intermediate B for two seasons. After that the club will have to go against "A" calibre clubs.

At press time, sponsorship was still being negotiated, and an executive was in the process of being put together. It ap-

The Georgetown Midgets started the new season on the right track last week with victories in their first two pre-season exhibition games. The victors of the two wins were Bramalea & Burlington respectively.

On Tuesday, Oct. 22, Georgetown, paced by centre Juri Kudrasovs who netted two goals and two assists, defeated Bramalea 6-1. Many of the Georgetown

boys had only one practice prior to this first exhibition encounter but the team showed enough to warrant respect from the other teams for the rest of the season.

In the first period Georgetown broke in front to stay with two quick goals, both on slapshots by Juri Kudrasovs before the game was five minutes old. Marty Fowler and Gord Foster assisted on his first effort while the second was unassisted. Bramalea then counted their only goal of the game two minutes later. Benny Heppes finished the scoring in the period on a pass from Juri Kudrasovs to make the count 3-1.

There was no scoring in the second period, but Georgetown did add three more to their total in the third. Charlie Fendley scored with Benny Heppes and Brian James assisting. Marty Fowler counted from Juri Kudrasovs and finally Dave Ward unassisted made the final score 6-1.

Doug Unsworth and John Blair in the Georgetown nets stopped 24 of 25 shots while their mates fired 27 at the Bramalea net.

Georgetown 4 - Burlington 2
On Saturday, Oct. 20, Georgetown travelled to Burlington and came home with a 4-2 victory. In this game the team was led by Paul Fendley who scored and had one assist. Also matching points with Paul was Benny Heppes with one goal and two assists. The team showed some improvement over the last game

LEGION MINOR HOCKEY RULES

- The hockey is hot to instigate with Sunday School or Day School activities.
- No member of the executive may coach, only in the case of an emergency.
- No father shall be allowed to coach his own son, or to be in the players box.
- If a boy misses 3 consecutive weeks, he will be put on a waiting list unless he has a good reason for not attending, coach and manager are responsible for attendance records to be available to their Commissioner in each league.
- A boy must be signed by Nov. 25, unless he has a good reason for not doing so. If not, then he will be put on a waiting list.
- No one member of the executive, commissioner, manager or coach may suspend a player for infraction or misconduct of the rules.
- The coach must give equal playing time to each player regardless of his playing ability, semi-finals and finals excepted.
- The following will be dealt with by the executive: (a) any boy using profane language in or around the profane language directly to arena; (b) any boy using or directed at any official, coach, manager or executive.
- A commissioner and any 2 members of the executive may suspend any player for infraction of the rules until it is dealt with by the executive.
- All players must report to their coach at least 15 minutes before game or coaches can refuse to dress him for that game. Coaches are expected to be on time.
- At the referee's discretion he is allowed to dispose of any hockey stick that is broken, chipped or considered dangerous to the players.
- Coaches and managers are responsible for the signing of sweaters and are expected to look after any equipment in their possession.
- Any manager or coach who wants equipment for a practice must give equipment manager 48 hours notice. No team can use sweaters that are used by Saturday Morning Hockey teams for a practice.
- Coaches or managers that have any complaints must take them to their commissioner and the commissioner is responsible to the executive.
- Any player suspended in either Legion sponsored hockey or Support Group hockey cannot participate in either group until he is dealt with.
- Players will not wear skates in seating area or deface the lobby and washrooms. Any infraction will be dealt with by Legion Minor Hockey executive. Coaches and managers are asked to cooperate.
- If it is your arena, treat it like home or you will be sent home.
- Coaches and managers are responsible for keeping their players under control.
- All players are required to wear head helmets and skate guards. Goal keepers must wear a mask.
- Insurance and birth certificates are compulsory prior to participation in Legion Minor Hockey.
- Any member of the executive missing 3 consecutive meetings will relinquish his position in Saturday Morning hockey.
