Forage Club Gets 3rd Interclub Competition

As compared to last year, The Dairy Competition — Halton County faltered in their largest one of the day, standings at the Provincial 4-H with 80 teams competing — Interclub Competitions held at the University of Guelph on Oct. 25th, 26th and 27th. Yet in Halton 4-H Jersey - Guernsey this strong competition local teams made a good showing.

In the Field Crop competition with 81 teams competing, the Halton 4-H Forage Club — with John Nurse of Georgetown and Don McClure of Georgetown as members — placed 3rd with a total score of 898 points out of a possible 1040. The winning team, from Wellington County, had 906 points. The Acton 4-H Forage Club, with team members Norma Leslie, Acton, and Bob Lasby, Rockwood, placed 13th, while Bob Harris, Milton, and Ken Alderson Hornby, of the Halton 4-H Corn Club, made a 27th place finish — still very respectable.
