# Thousand Jehovah's Witnesses Here For Three Day Convention

"Watchtower" and "Awake!" have become household words with most people, for these words are synonymous with Jehovah's Witnesses. As the of Jehovah's Witnesses, their combined semi-monthly circulation exceeds 10 1/2 million, the Watchtower being printed in 72 languages.

Georgetown residents will become even more familiar with the Watchtower and Awake when 1,000 Jehovah's Witnesses meet at Georgetown District High School, November 15-17. Many delegates to the convention will distribute the journals throughout the Georgetown area. The house-to-house visits will also include an invitation to attend the Sunday afternoon feature talk, "God's Way is Love," to be delivered by J.F. MacPherson, district supervisor of Jehovah's Witnesses.

"In many respects our public ministry is only a small part of our lives as Christians," says John Vincent, 44 King St. East. A member of the Georgetown congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, Mr. Vincent supports his wife and two children, Keenan, 11, and Clella, 10, as an office worker. "Watchtower with us is a way of life, covering all facets of Christian living. The Bible is our guidebook."

A brief look at their schedule testifies to that. Each day begins with a few minutes of religious instruction before breakfast. The Watchtower and Awake are read at lunchtime, or on other occasions when the information is pertinent to the family's problems or interests.

Monday evening is set aside for family Bible study while Tuesday evening the whole family participates in group Bible meetings arranged in private homes of those in the congregation. Thursday evening the Vincents attend a ministry school at the Kingdom Hall. Here the children as well as adults have the opportunity to present short talks or demonstrations with Bible themes. The whole family attends a public Bible lecture on Sunday morning. All this training and Bible instruction is then put into operation in the public ministry. "To provide a refreshing balance," Mr. Vincent assures, "wholesome family recreation is interspersed throughout our way of life."

The Vincents will all be present at the upcoming circuit assembly and will share in the distribution of the Watchtower and Awake, inviting Georgetown-residents to attend the sessions.
