

Seven New Members Were Welcomed To Smith & Stone-Plax 25 Year Club

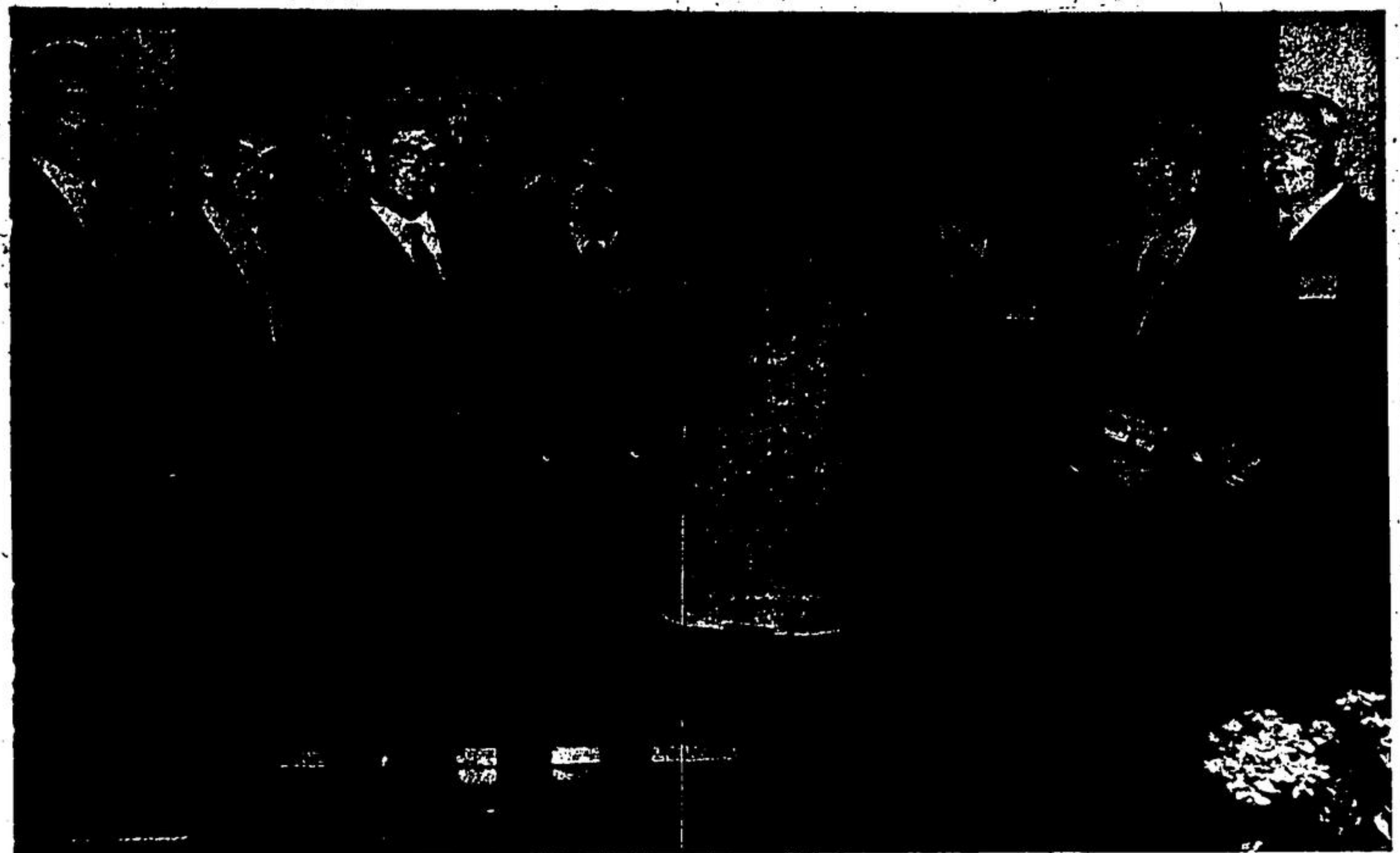
