The Lorne Scots have returned once more with overall honors from the annual Central District Militia and Ontario Rifle Association shoot at Camp Borden.

The meet, officiated by the Ontario Rifle Association, had all rules and regulations laid down for it by Central District Militia Headquarters.

Competition waged on four separate classes of shooting expertise, from top to bottom these were Master, Expert, Sharpshooter and Marksmen.

The Lorne Scots, because of their noted excellence in riflery were allowed to compete in only the top two categories.

In the Masters team competition two Lorne Scots teams were entered and they walked off with first and second place.

Winner of the Gowaski trophy for individual shooting honors was WO L. Fish, who has also been chosen for the 1947 Blaisy team to compete in the world-wide shoot, open to both military and civilians, in England next year.

performance, WO Fish took the Individual Service Conditions Match, which requires entrants to shoot at time targets at varying ranges from 500 to 100 yards.

In the Master class out of a possible 10 trophies the Lorne Scots captured eight, and out of an overall 18 team and individual trophies they won 11.

This was the last shoot for the team's captain, Lt. W. Waring, who is retiring because of ill health.
