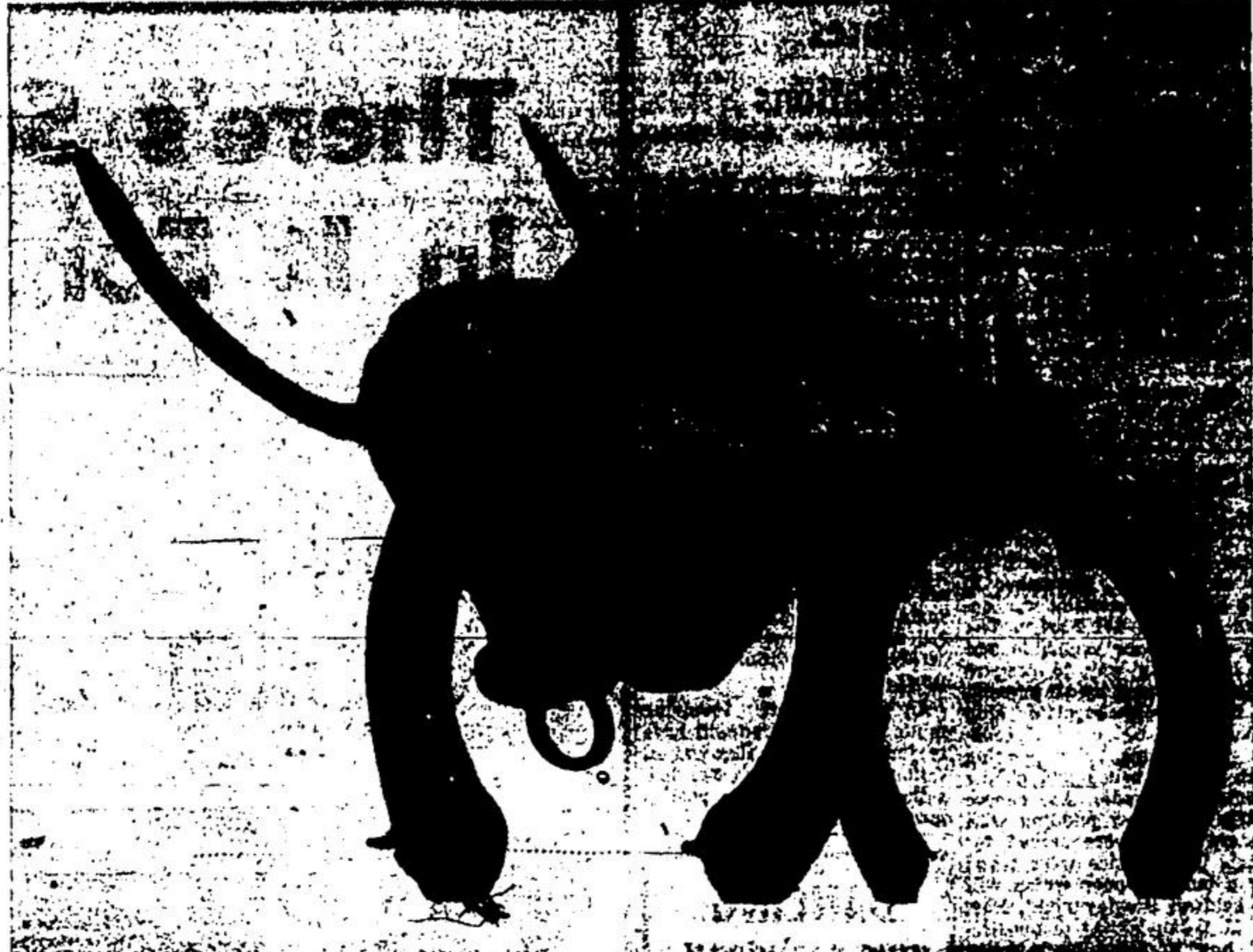

## Lawyers Want Uniform Age For Offenders in Juvenile Court

The Halton Law Association feels that there should be a uniform maximum age across Canada at which a juvenile becomes an adult in the eyes of the law, said Peter McWilliams, president of the association.

The former crown attorney said this week that he thinks the present age limits in different provinces are grossly discriminatory, varying from 16 in Ontario to 18 in British Columbia.

**Criminal Record**  
 In Ontario, a youthful offender at the age of 16 receives a criminal record if he is convicted of a criminal offense, whereas in Quebec and British Columbia the youth is still a juvenile and therefore has no criminal record because he comes before a juvenile court rather than a criminal court.

"The issue of the maximum juvenile age limit came up in Halton last week when Georgetown Magistrate Kenneth Langdon spoke out against the law which compels courts in Ontario to try 16-year-old youths as adults, regardless of their mental and emotional maturity."

McWilliams said that it is not as bad as it seems as Ontario has a highly-developed reformatory system designed for youthful offenders over the age of 16.

"However, it is distressing that a 16 year old offender has to spend time in a county jail where there is no adequate separation of prisoners by age or criminal record."

**Law Association**  
 He says that the Halton Law Association recommends that jails in the province provide adequate separation of hardened criminals from first time offenders.

There should also be the innovation of conditional discharge in Ontario, he said, to enable the courts to place a youthful offender on probation, without confining him and giving him a criminal record.

A similar system has been in effect in England since 1938, said McWilliams, and has been very successful.

 A Georgetown woman, Mrs. Mary Pickett was named Halton's Queen of the Furrow at the annual county plowing match Saturday. This year two contestants vied for the honor. They were judged on their plowing ability, public speaking, poise and personality.

Mrs. Joyce Ruddell was runner-up.

Mrs. Pickett succeeds Rosemary Booth who held the title for two years. Previous Furrow Queens were Janette Finnie, Verna Thompson, and Ria Wilson.
