### Cattalo May Provide New Canadian Source of Beef

Question: When is a buffalo not a buffalo?  
 Answer: When it's a cattalo.  
 And what is a cattalo? Simply it's a cross between a buffalo and a domestic cattle.

**MANY MYSTERIES**  
 Simple it may sound to the layman. But to researchers from the Ontario Veterinary College, Guelph, who descended on Hutton Region Conservation Authority's game preserve at Battlesnake Point Thursday, there are many mysteries involved.

And their main problem is to find out why the cow of such unions is fertile and the bull sterile.

The project is being directed by Dr. P. K. Basur of the department of anatomy, department of veterinary science. She was accompanied by Dr. John Gilman, head of the department and other research personnel from Guelph.

Their main job was to take blood samples from some of the four adult and four calf buffalos which now roam the authority's preserve west of Milton.

After much sweating and at least one broken rope, research assistants finally managed to get enough buffalos into the corral for blood samples to be taken.

Dr. Basur said that enzymes and chromosomes in the blood will be studied to establish if any abnormalities exist in their cytogenetic makeup. This may give researchers a clue to why male cattalos are sterile.

"The female is the hope of the whole project, because she is not sterile," Dr. Basur said. She said the buffalos' tails may require some kind of hormone treatment to correct any abnormalities in their blood making their male cattalos offspring sterile.

The success of the program may provide a new source of beef in Canada. The advantages of cattalo would be that they combine the best characteristics of buffalo — strength and hardiness in the winter — with the best qualities of domestic cattle.

"Cattalo meat has also been found to be very tasty and a good source of nutrition," Dr. Basur said.

### Displays, Songs, Dances In 'Y' Carnival of Nations

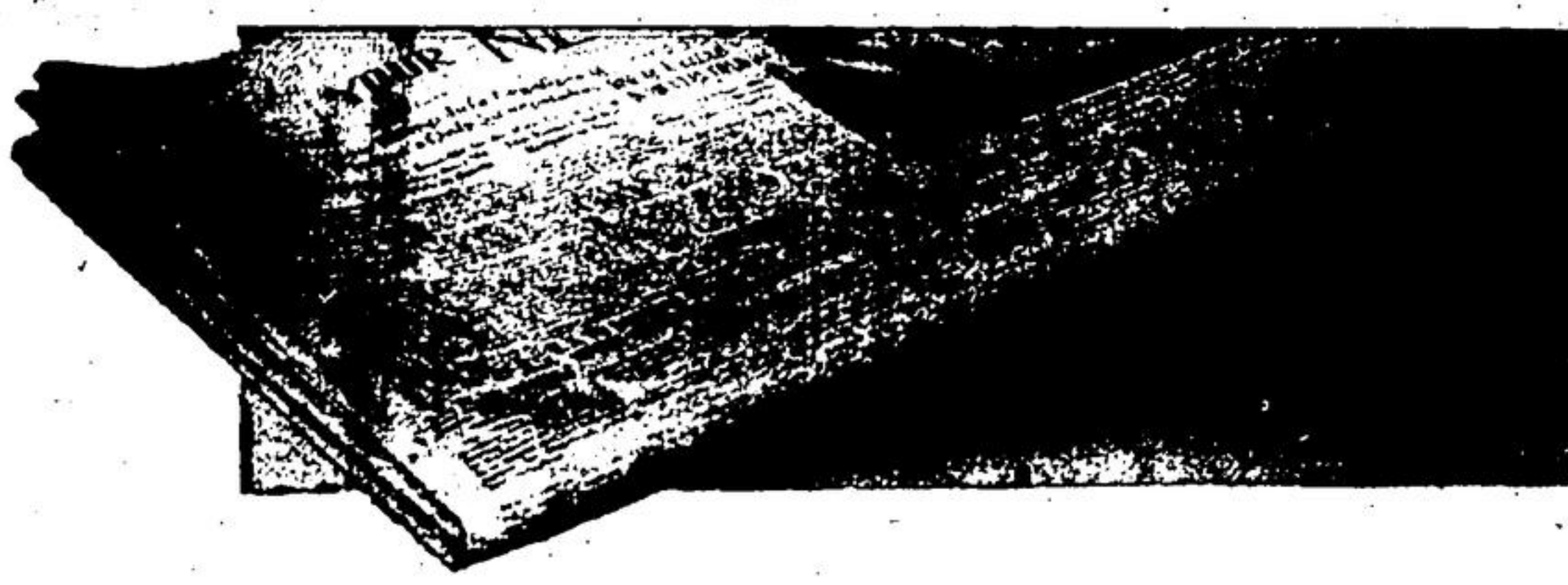
