Assistant Manager, Campbell Joins Georgetown Hydro Staff

An assistant manager has been appointed for Georgetown Hydro-Electric Commission. He is Hugh Donald Campbell, 36, formerly line foreman for Richmond Hill Hydro. He started his new duties last month.

In making this announcement, Chairman John T. Armstrong stated that Mr. Campbell will assist the manager, Graham Farnell, and will be responsible for directing the outside crews in line building and maintenance work, also planning for future extensions to the present system.

Chairman Armstrong pointed out that the utility's facilities have been expanding at a remarkable rate in the past five years to keep up with the demand in the rapidly growing community. Since 1963, nearly a thousand customers have been added and there are now over 4,000 consumers. The peak load for Georgetown Hydro is now nearly 18,000 kilowatts, which is double the load of 1963, an amazing increase for that short period, Mr. Armstrong stated.

He added that it is necessary to increase the office and the

outside staffs to keep pace with the increasing demands of administering and operating this growing utility.

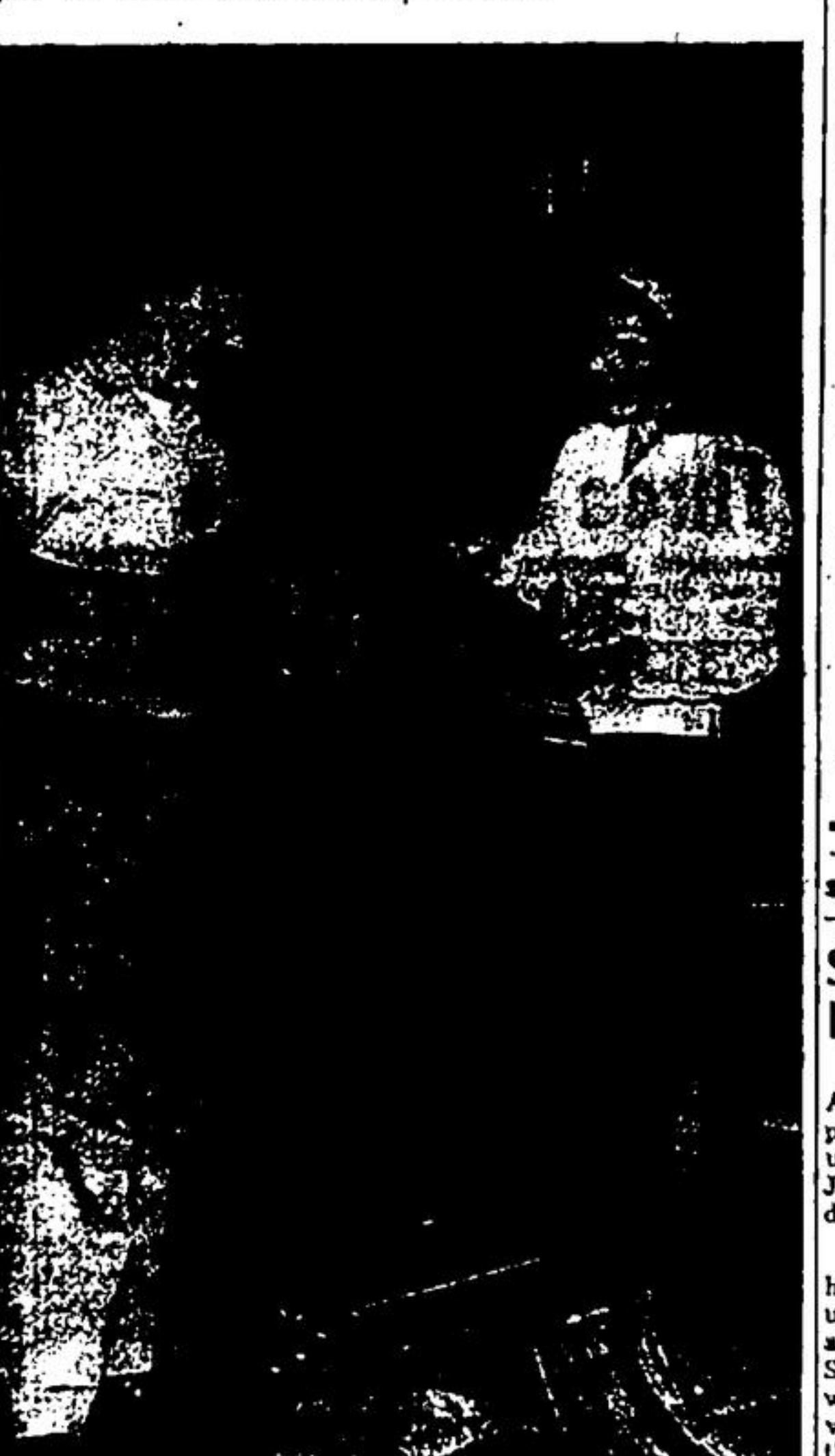
The new assistant manager, Mr. Campbell, was born in Toronto and attended grade schools there and Northern Vocational School. His father was a well known, long time official of Toronto Hydro-Electric System. Hugh Campbell started his career as an apprentice electrician with Windler Electric Company. Then he worked for 3 years with a line contracting firm, Heavy Duty Line and Cable Company.

In 1967, Hugh Campbell joined the staff of Richmond Hill Hydro as a lineman. Five years later he became line foreman and continued in that position until his recent appointment as assistant manager for Georgetown Hydro Electric Commission.
