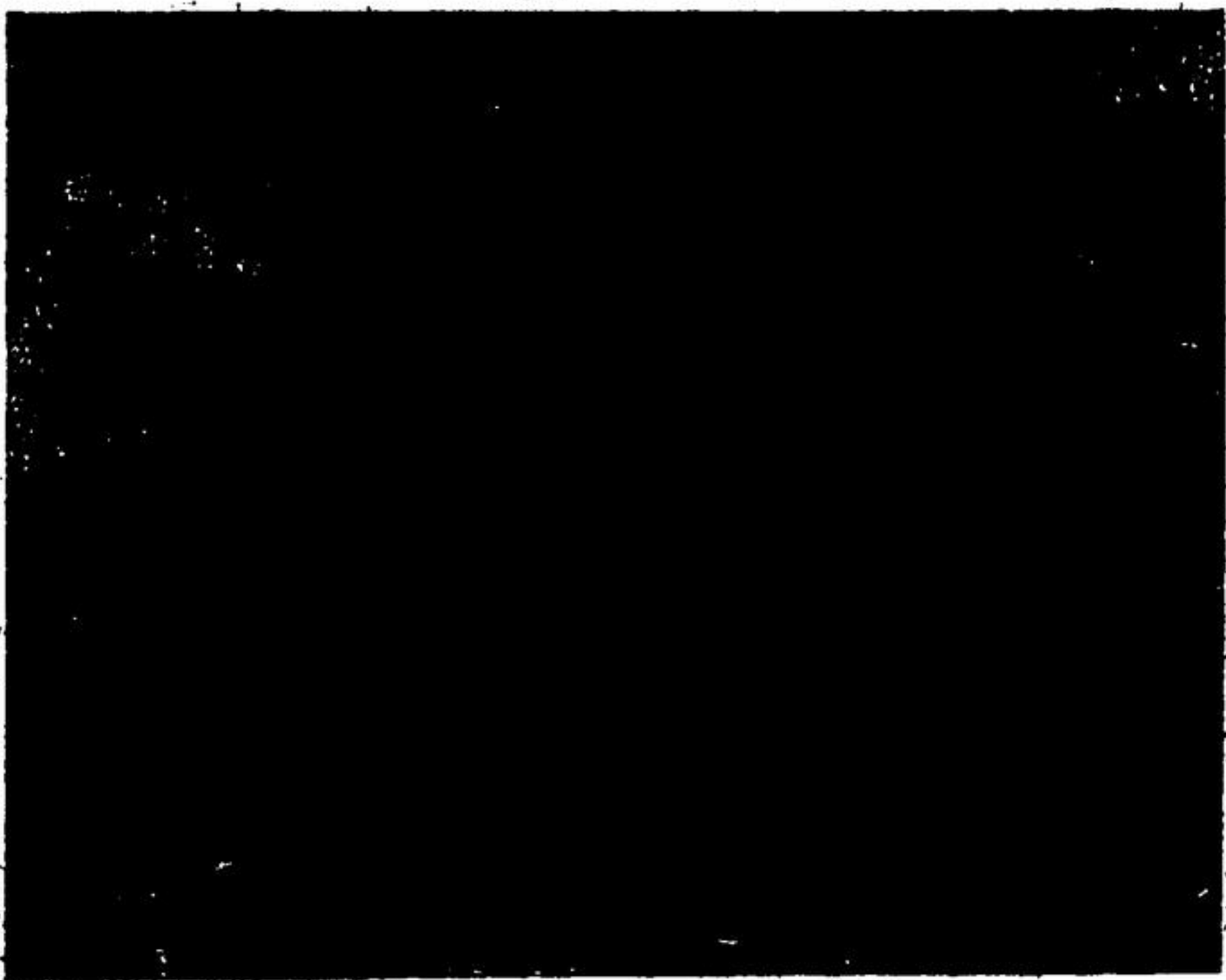

The trials, sponsored by the Irish Setter Club of Canada, originated about 15 years ago in Clarkson with a very small number taking part. But in recent years they have been held at the Georgetown farm each spring and fall attracting setter fanciers from all points of the compass, some from as far away as B.C. and as far south as Georgia. One trial last year drew a hundred entries. Future trials will see the owner of the winning dog awarded the Wesley Lonson Memorial Trophy, which Mrs. Lonson and Peter Snider intend to create for biennial presentation. And letting other canines try to outdo the setters in the field. Mr. Snider points out anyone, whether they own a dog or not, is welcome to attend the trials.

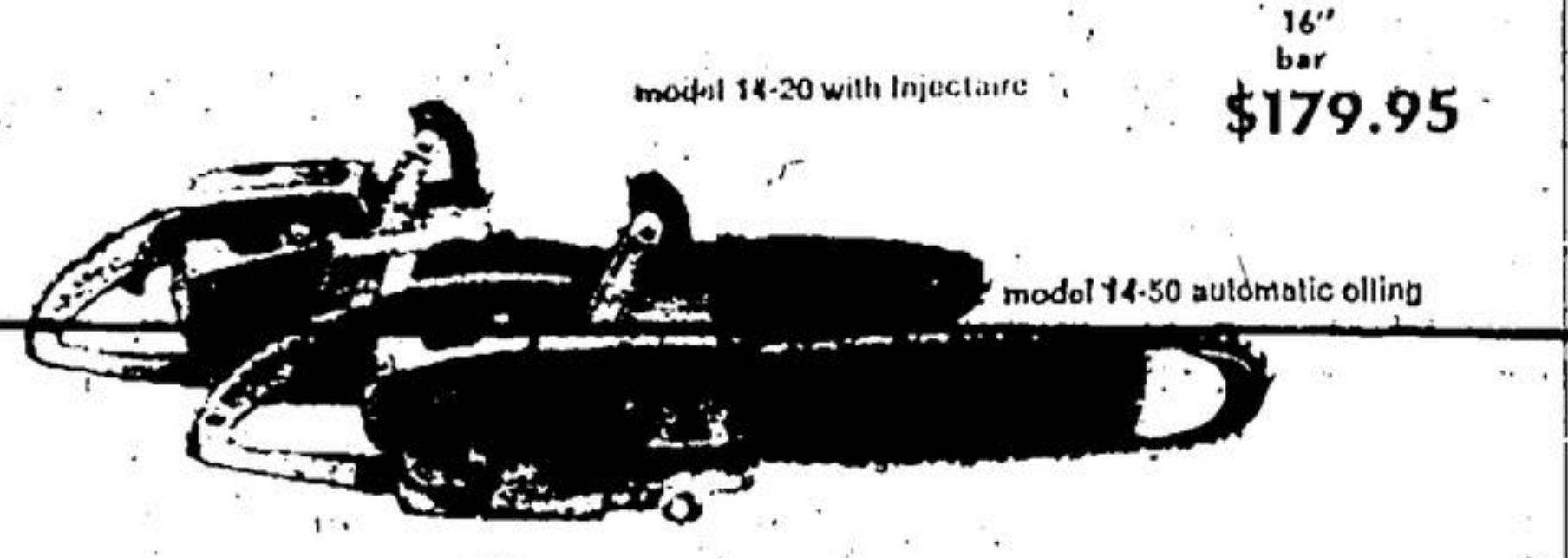
