HIGH SCHOOL AT MODEL U.N.

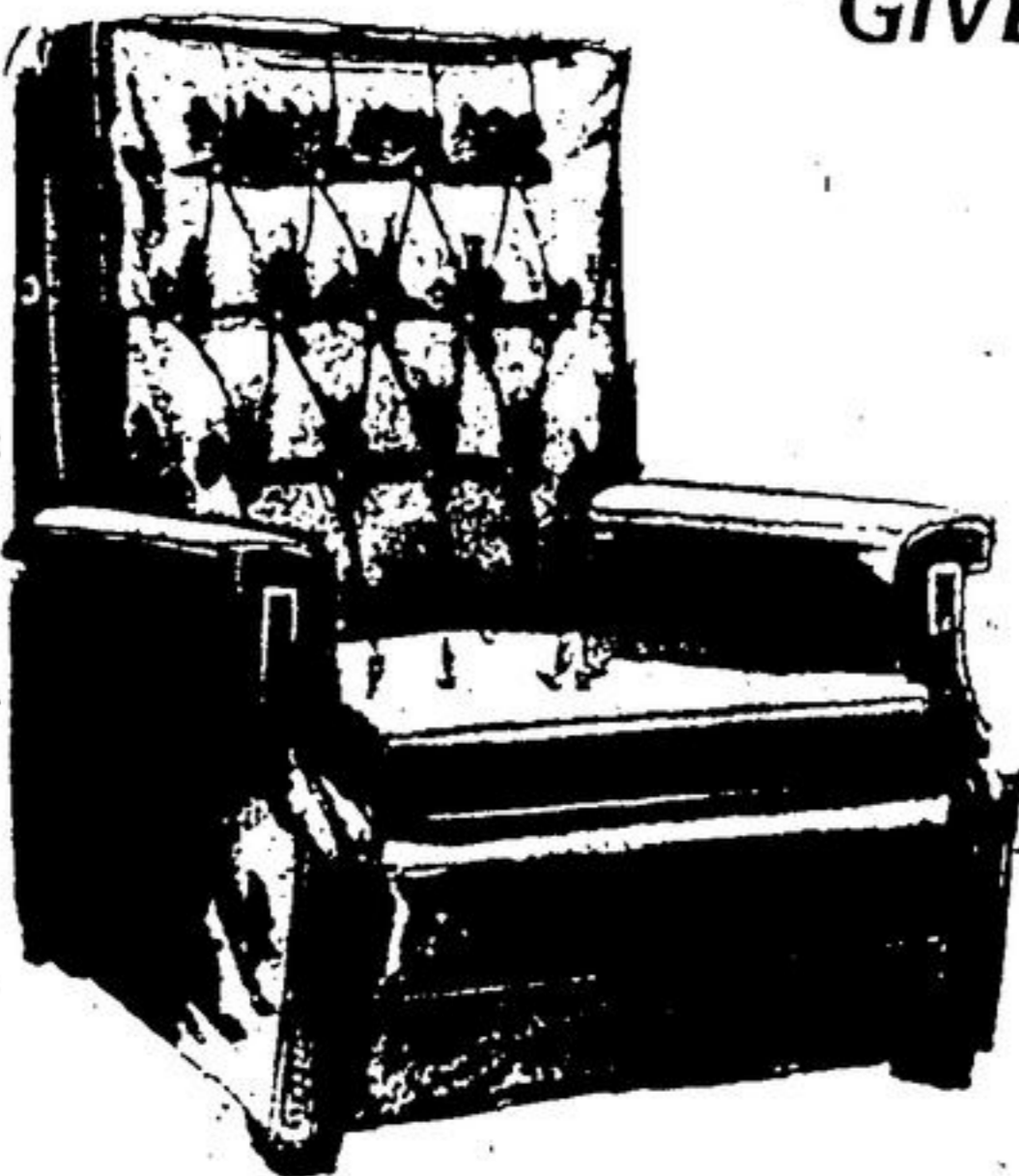
Five delegations from Georgetown District High School will attend a model United Nations General Assembly in Port Credit this weekend.
