

# Totalled Sixty Years on Public School Board

A total of sixty years service to education is the record of three long time members of the Georgetown Public School Board, Ed Wilson, Stan Finlay and Harry Shortill.

Ed Wilson, vice-chairman of the Board, has served twenty years, Stan Finlay also an ex-chairman, has served nineteen years, and Harry Shortill has the record of twenty years.

From the beginning of their service until now, the last year of the Board, the school population has grown from almost three hundred to three thousand and the number of schools from one to six. Chapel Street School served the whole town until 1903, when Wrigglesworth school opened.

Local school boards disappeared at the end of the year, when the new County Board of Education takes over.

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## Safety Committee Studies By-Laws

The recently formed public safety committee had their first meeting last week. Still feeling their way, the committee, under chairman Colin Blight, decided that the first move should be a study of all existing safety by-laws.

They felt they should be a clearing house for potential hazards, noticed by any member of the public. As a result they ask to be informed of any dangerous situation spotted by a resident. They would then investigate, and make their recommendations to the town Safety Inspector.

The committee, consisting of chairman Colin Blight, secretary Frank Tyrell, Fred Hue, Erwin Lewis, Leaman Allen and Richard Foster, was appointed by council at the urging of the Halton Hills Ratepayers Association following the August drowning of a two and a half year old boy, in a water-filled excavation.

## Massive Report Awaits New County School Board

A massive four volume report on education in Halton county has been completed.

The report was given final approval last week by the county's Interim School Organization Committee (ISOC), which prepared the report for the new Halton Board of Education. The regional board will be elected December 2, and when it takes office in January it will replace all other education boards now operating in Halton County.

The report is the result of 10 months of ISOC meetings.

There is one volume each devoted to policy, program and accommodation. The fourth volume covers procedure, personnel and transportation.

Only 25 copies of the full 4-volume report have been published. However, ISOC has printed 300 copies of a one-volume condensed report of its findings.

The full report will be distributed to public libraries, clerks of each municipality and the secretary-treasurer of each local board.

The condensed version will be made available to principals, members of all public school boards in the county, persons seeking election to the county board.

board and certain other groups. Fred Armitage, of Burlington, chairman of ISOC, said he was most pleased with the work of the committee.

"If this committee is any indication of what the county board will be like, and I believe it is, the county board will have no problems in moving off in the proper direction to attain its goals," he said.

ISOC was made up of various board members from each of the county's local school boards. Many of ISOC's members will seek election to the county board.

Armitage said that one of the side benefits of ISOC was that it gave its members practice in thinking like county representatives. He said when ISOC first met the Burlington representatives were worried about the attitude North Halton members would have towards them. But that their fears were soon dispelled. He added that Burlington is now realizing that different educational problems exist in the northern part of the county than in Burlington.

The changeover from local school boards to the regional concept for administering education is part of an Ontario-wide program being carried out under the Ontario Department of Education.
