Mrs. English occasionally works with children in the public schools who have speech difficulties as well as with victims of stroke. Her course in Occupational Therapy at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles included speech therapy. She worked in the Hospital for Sick Children in Los Angeles and during the war, worked in a neuro-surgical hospital of the U.S. Army in Kentucky where speech therapy was used for brain-damaged soldiers. She also worked for about two years voluntarily with the retarded children at the Sunshine School in Hornby before her work in the public schools.
