## Barratt Top Marksman At Chinguacousy Shoot

Earlier this year, Cst. Barratt established himself as top shot in the Georgetown department. Georgetown police officers intend to be heard from more often in revolver shooting competition and are building a practice range with inter-squad and inter-department matches in mind.
