

Intermediate Raiders Debut On Home Ice This Friday

A large crowd is expected to be on hand to help usher back Friday night intermediate hockey to Georgetown tomorrow night. An intermediate Raider devylee of past seasons, Mrs. Jack Kemshad Sr. will make it official when she drops the puck at the start of the game between Raiders and Durham, reportedly the class of the intermediate B league into which Georgetown has been accepted.

Raiders themselves helped make the Durham - Georgetown match even more attractive by upsetting Fergus Thistles 6-4 in their season opener in Fergus Friday night. After two periods it appeared Georgetown was about to start the 1968-69 march on the wrong foot, but extra effort in the third period produced four goals and the all important victory.

As an incentive, club officials are giving children of 12 years of age and under free access to the home opener provided they are accompanied by an adult.

Robinson was the game's play maker with four assists.

Fergus scored the first goal and owned a 2-1 lead at the end of the period. Raiders continued to trail as each team added a goal in the second, but Thistles' fourth tally triggered the Georgetown explosion that turned the tables. They fired four goals in a span of a dozen minutes to stun the partisan crowd.

Inglis fashined his hat trick during the late eruption.

Fred Cowbrough psychologically took the steam out of the Fergus effort by robbing a Fergus player on a penalty shot at a time when Raiders needed the lift.

Seek Stewarttown Road Improvements for Safety

Urged on by a delegation and a petition, from Stewarttown residents concerned about traffic safety, Esqueing School Board at a meeting last week asked County Engineer J. Corbett for three road improvements. They sought the widening of the 7th Line shoulder, south of the 17th sideroad, the repair of the sidewalk on the south hill, and a better railing on the bridge.

The petitioners had not asked for these particular improvements, they had asked on two occasions for more school bus stops through Stewarttown.

However, the board rejected the request because they felt more bus stops would be dangerous, and the Department of Transport regulations would not allow it.

The board then sought the opinion of the Department of Transport, who together with MPP Jim Snow, and the OPP investigated. The OPP watched the bus stops from unmarked cars on several occasions.

The resulting department report would not allow any more bus stops; but did recommend the widening of the shoulders on the 7th Line, south of 17 sideroad for pedestrian use.

The other requests were made by the board.

The parents at the meeting representing all petitioners, Mrs. J. Stewart, Mrs. B. Beckitt and Mrs. J. Thoms pointed out that the space between the last railing on the bridge and the sidewalk, was large enough to let a child slip into the creek.

Jim Snow MPP for Halton East, county engineer J. Corbett, Reeve George Currie and deputy reeve Tom Hill also attended the meeting.

School Board chairman William Lawson asked Reeve Currie what had become of the petition for a crosswalk at Norval. In reply, the Reeve reported council had asked the Department of Transport to make a survey, with a view to erecting traffic lights at the junction of the town line and Highway 7.

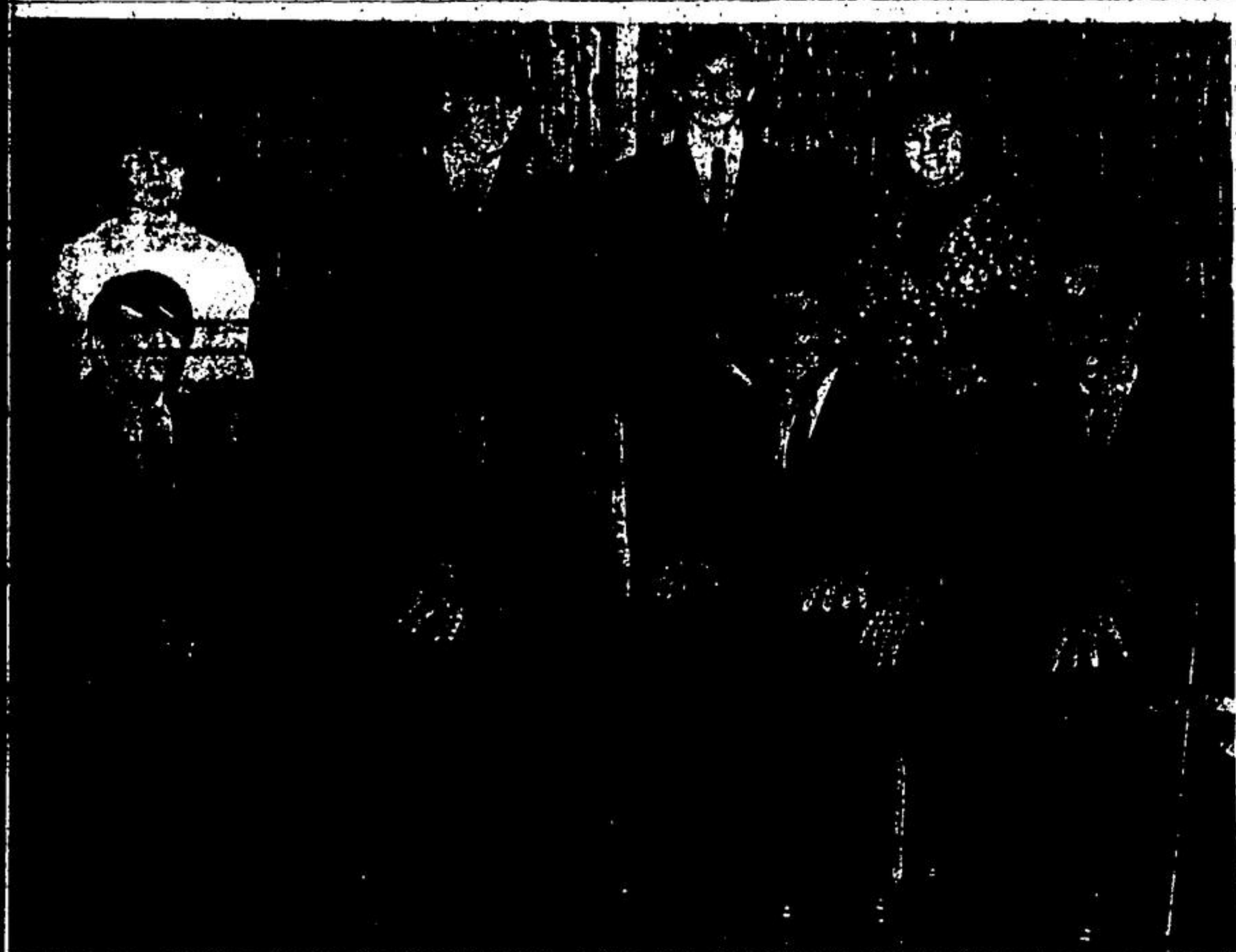
