

CHATTING....

Imagine getting fascinated by bath tub plugs when you're on a beautiful motor trip. That's what happened to me while holidaying recently around the Gaspe, Cape Breton and the Maritimes.

I don't think I'm all that demanding as far as accommodation is concerned, but at the end of a long day's travelling, I dearly love a hot bath. So, during our trip, we always tried to find accommodation which included a tub rather than shower.

It was thus I became somewhat of an authority on the way modern bath-tub plugs do, or do not, operate. Some worked fine when you filled the tub, but when you tried to drain it, the plug wouldn't budge. And vice versa. When this happened, there being no plumbing on call at 11 p.m. for such minor disasters, I just used a towel over the drain as a stop-gap. Sometimes the operation of the bathtub and shower involved a large dial-like affair which looked complicated enough to get an airplane off the ground. Fiddling with these controls caused me to have several unmeditated showers, and years for the good old days of simple plugs on chains.

Even aside from the efficiency of their bath-tubs, I found the motels themselves fascinating. I always looked forward to that first peek inside the motel room. No two were alike.

Seems to me women enjoy a trip of this type even more than men. For us, it is the supreme luxury to be able to crawl out of bed every morning, bathe and dress, and just leave everything while we go to a breakfast someone else has prepared. And at the end of two weeks it was still pure bliss to have meals served to me, and to rise from the table with nary a dish to clear or wash. An affair however, by this time, my friend husband began to long audibly for poached eggs on toast, served up by the *Bien maitre d'.*

To say I was fascinated by motels and bath tub plugs is using the word pretty loosely. What really absorbed me completely on our trip, was the absolutely magnificent scenery. Mile after mile, and hour after hour of it.

After the rugged cliffs of the Gaspe, with the sea seldom more than a stone's throw away we were afraid Cape Breton might pall. Equally beautiful, their mountains aflame with autumn foliage, the lonely "highlands" captivated us. We stayed overnight near Chediac, a fishing community at the start of the Cabot Trail. There, the women while away the quiet hours by doing their famous wool hooking, which is finer than needlepoint.

Chediac is a beauty-spot, but holds the seeds of sadness for its young people, as we discovered when chatting with a young waitress in a motel dining room. A recent nursing graduate from Halifax General Hospital, Chediac was her home town. She loved it, and appreciated its beauty. But she was quite frank about the fact that if she wanted to marry and have a home of her own she had to leave Chediac. All the young men not interested in fishing or lumbering, moved away after graduating from high school. It was a social pattern repeated many times in the area.

A man-made high point of interest on the Trail, was the Alexander Graham Bell museum at Baddeck. In addition to being a veritable "jewel of a place" architecturally, it was an eye-opener to us to see the genius this great Canadian displayed in pioneering air-travel, X-rays, air conditioning, the iron lung, and so many other inventions in addition to the telephone, that I can't remember them all.

As for Prince Edward Island, some of them in Georgetown, a pastoral gem in living technique, what can I say to do it!
