"Hard Five Minutes" Says Retiring Mayor

"One of the hardest five minutes I've spent in front of a microphone," said Mayor Joseph Gibbons as he addressed Monday's nomination meeting.

Mr. Gibbons had announced at a press conference last week that he would not be a candidate for the office which he has held for eighteen years, at various times, the latest for a five year period.

Cec Davidson, who was chairman for a public meeting following nominations, said that the mayor has done a tremendous job for the 'good old town of Georgetown' as Mr. Gibbons always terms the community.

Mr. Gibbons, in turn expressed his pleasure at being involved in municipal politics, and said that any assistance he can give the incoming council is theirs for the asking.

"My decision is not prompted by any person or group," he said. "The only person who has influenced me is the person with whom I have spent the last forty years," looking at his wife in the audience.

The mayor said politicians are constantly making mistakes — "that's why they are criticized and that's why they are changed."

"I am proud that I have the intestinal fortitude to say the time has come to hand the mayor's job over to someone else," he said.
